LAST NIGHT'S DISPATCHES TO THE RECORD-UNION.

THE IMPROVEMENT MAINTAINED. Continued Hopefulness in regard to the President.

A PENNSYLVANIA CONGRESSMAN DEAD. Refreshing Showers in Some Portions of the State.

DOMESTIC. Condition of the President - Morning Bulletin.

EXECUTIVE MANSION, WASHINGTON, September 21-23.30 A. M. The President slept well during the night, and this morning his condition is in all respects as favorable as yesterday at the same hour.

Indian Outbreak in Texas. FORT DAVIS, September 21.-A party of Indians yesterday raided Beckwith's ranch at Pecos, City, killing and capturing several men and driving off a large number of horses belonging to the ranch and other neighboring ranches.

The Evening Report. EXECUTIVE MANSION, September 21-23.30 P. M. The President appears better today than for some days past.

The Situation at Midnight. EXECUTIVE MANSION, September 21-Midnight. The President's symptoms are still favorable, and he is now resting quietly.

All Quiet at the White House. WASHINGTON, September 21-1.15 A. M. Everything is quiet at the Executive Mansion, with nothing to indicate any change in the favorable symptoms which prevailed at midnight.

Blaine to Lowell. WASHINGTON, September 21.-The following was sent by Gladstone Lowell to-night: "The President had a very satisfactory day, and in the judgment of the surgeons all the symptoms are favorable to-night."

The President's Wound-A Thunder-Storm Destroyed. WASHINGTON, September 21.-The following is furnished by one of the physicians in attendance upon the President: The tube which is now in the wound is in good condition, and the wound is in all respects as favorable as yesterday.

The Removal of the President. SPECIAL AGENT, September 21.-The Pennsylvania Railroad Company has prepared a special train to take the President to Long Branch, should it be decided to remove him to that place.

Refreshment Showers. NEW YORK, September 21.-Refreshment showers fell last night here and in Pennsylvania.

Boston Weather. BOSTON, September 21.-Four strokes are reported in Boston, and the thermometer is 96. It is the second hottest day of the season.

Old Californians in New York. NEW YORK, September 21.-Old Californians are here in large numbers, and are being entertained by a social gathering and dinner at the Oriental Hotel, Manhattan Beach, on Saturday, the 24th.

Delmonico's Dying. NEW YORK, September 21.-Lorenzo Delmonico, the well-known caterer and restaurateur, is dying at Lake George, in his 72d year.

Hogate's Flight. WASHINGTON, September 21.-Captain Hogate's bondsmen are making inquiries in Cooper's plea of self-defense, but those who saw the affair say it was a cowardly assault.

General Strike of Laborers. GALVESTON, September 21.-A general strike took place to-day among the laboring men, including the longshoremen, car-drivers, laborers at the oil wells, cotton pickers, etc.

Only Holding His Own. WASHINGTON, September 21.-The President only held his own to-day, but the symptoms are favorable. His pulse is lower and steadier, and the attendants think his pulse the best of any time yet.

Death of Congressman Wright. WILKESBARRE (Pa.), September 21.-Hendrick B. Wright died here this evening.

Two Female "Cranks." NEW YORK, September 21.-Two women were committed to the Asylum yesterday. Both are insane in the subject of the President's illness.

Will Visit Yorktown. WASHINGTON, September 21.-The Marquis de Rochambeau states that himself and his wife will attend the Yorktown Centennial.

Negro Beheaded. CHATTANOOGA, September 21.-Henry Lawson, a negro, was hanged here to-day for a criminal assault upon a white girl. He was 35 years of age.

A Clearing in Chicago. CHICAGO, September 21.-The bank clearing to-day was \$80,000,000, which is \$12,000,000 higher than any preceding day. The next highest was August 21.

The Wrong Man Killed. NEW HOPE (Pa.), September 21.-Balliff Dennis and a posse yesterday went to a hut to arrest a negro charged with assaulting a woman, and killed a negro who ran out. He proved to be another man.

Rubber Works Burned. SOUTH HAVEN (Mass.), September 21.-Clapp's rubber works were burned to-day. Loss, \$75,000.

Schools Closed by the Hot Weather. NEW YORK, September 21.-The public schools of Jersey City will be continued closed another week, owing to the intense heat.

FOREIGN. Protecting the Jews. BERLIN, September 21.-The Minister of the Interior has instructed the authorities to deal energetically with any fanaticism directed against the Jews.

The Chess Congress. BERLIN, September 21.-At the Chess Congress yesterday, a dispute between Mason, of New York, and Berger, of Graz, resulted in a draw.

Petition in Yellow fever. PARIS, September 21.-Yellow fever is still raging in Senegal, and in the localities the pestilence is causing a panic. Ships are ordered to sail for France as soon as possible.

States and the Presidency. PARIS, September 21.-President Grevy is quite ready to offer Gambetta the Premiership, but he will wait until Jules Ferry counters a hostile vote in the Chamber of Deputies.

Expulsion of Socialists. STRASBURG, September 21.-The Alsace-Lorraine Gazette says the Governor has expelled from Strasbourg two socialists suspected of being connected with the German Socialist propagandists in Alsace-Lorraine.

Death of an Artist. LONDON, September 21.-The death is announced of Gustave Richter, the German painter and professor in the Berlin Academy of Art.

The Trouble in Tunis. TUNIS, September 21.-Various accounts show that the area of disturbances is constantly increasing, and in the vicinity of the frontier of Morocco to the extremity of Tunis. The Arabs are concentrating to defend Kairouan.

Election for Parliament. LONDON, September 21.-The election to fill the vacancy in the House of Commons caused by the death of Laycock (Liberal), resulted in the return of Lovell (Conservative). The poll stood: Lovell, 4,200; Tomline (Liberal), 3,729. Lovell, during the canvassing, declared strongly in favor of fair trade as opposed to free trade.

Another Gunpowder Plot. LONDON, September 21.-Eight cartridges marked "U. S." have been discovered in a box of cotton at the Albany Spinning Company's works near Oldham. It is believed that they were placed there with the design of setting fire to the mill. The usual French reports are correct.

Cont ct with the Police. CORK, September 21.-A party of men engaged in raiding for arms near Mill street last night, encountered the police patrol, and the conflict which ensued resulted in the death of a man named Hickie and three other raiders and a policeman wounded.

Thirty Families Rendered Homeless by Fire. PEMBRIDGE (Ont.), September 21.-Upwards of thirty families in the townships of Wilberforce, Stafford and Bromley have been rendered homeless by bush fires since Wednesday. All are destitute and making fifty Crops, buildings and everything they possessed have been swept away.
