THE Train-Wreckers' Trial. ARBUN, November 17th.—This is the eighth day of the trial of Steingal, one of the train-wreckers, and the evidence on the part of the prosecution will be concluded before to-morrow night, which time the Court will adjourn until next Monday.

Further Railroad Surveys. YUMA, November 17th.—A telegram was received here this afternoon engaging teams for use in further surveys of the Yuma and Fort Yuma Railroads.

ADVISED FROM PORTLAND. PORTLAND, November 17th.—The British ship Edith Lorne, with Captain Wood as pilot, attempted to sail out without a tug this morning. The steamer Oregon, which returned to Astoria from Cape Hancock at 4:40 P. M., reports the Lorne grounded on the north end of the middle sands. Tugs have gone to her assistance.

DELIVERED HIMSELF UP. SALINAS, November 17th.—Thomas Garcia, who was arrested on a charge of murder in the case of Alice Garcia, at the social dance near Salinas on the night of the 9th instant, was brought to New York on a train which left Salinas this morning, and is now in jail. The wounded girl is doing well, and all the news are entertained of her speedy recovery.

HELD TO ANSWER. STOCKTON, November 17th.—E. J. Cripe, alias Wilson, waived examination before the United States Commissioner at Stockton, and was held to answer. His bail was fixed at \$500, but he failed to give the required bond, and was placed in jail.

FORTY YEARS IN THE STATE PRISON. NAVAJO, November 17th.—Judge Caldwell today sentenced Peter Johnson, convicted of murder in the second degree, to forty years in the State Prison at Folsom. A motion for a new trial was overruled, and the plea for defendant will probably appeal the case to the Supreme Court.

NEW TELEPHONE LINE. MARTINEZ, November 17th.—The Contra Costa telephone line, just completed from the city to Martinez, is now in operation. The line extends from the Granger's wharf, near Port Costa, to Walnut Creek, via Martinez, opening up an important route of communication.

THE SAN JOSE LIEB CASE. SAN JOSE, November 17th.—D. M. Delmas, counsel for plaintiff, resumed his oral examination of the witness, Mrs. L. M. Lieb, in the case of Lieb vs. Lieb, which is now on for trial in the Superior Court.

CRANK IN SAN FRANCISCO—DEATH. SAN FRANCISCO, November 17th.—This morning a man, who gives the name of Graham, applied at Leland Stanford's office for admittance, claiming that he was the only living man who gives the name of Graham, and that everything that he had been through her. She answered, she said, that she had never known any man by the name of Graham, and that she had never seen him.

OFFICE CLAIMED—RESOLUTIONS OF RESPECT—SIGNAL SERVICE MATTERS. SAN FRANCISCO, November 17th.—Mayor Kallach has convened a special meeting of the Board of Supervisors, to be held to-morrow, to consider applications for certificates of the number of votes polled at the election during the rainy season, and the transmission of reports to and from Washington, rendered it an urgent necessity for San Francisco to make her own preparations for the winter.

WEATHER REPORT. NORTH SAN JUAN, November 17th.—A snow-storm of unprecedented severity for this time of the year visited this section of the State during the rainy season, and to a depth of over three inches, and much deeper further up in the mountains. The storm broke early this morning, and the snow is fast dissolving.

DEATH TRIAL ON THE COAST—PERSONAL. VIRGINIA, November 17th.—The trial of Denis Hennessy, for the killing of Deputy County Clerk Keeler in June last, was continued in the District Court. The evidence is all in, and the arguments of counsel will be heard at 10 o'clock to-morrow morning.

AN OLD LADY KILLED—SNOW SLIDE. SALT LAKE, November 17th.—An old lady, name unknown, was run over this afternoon by a freight train two miles south of this city and killed.

TRIAL OF THE INDIANS. GRANT, November 17th.—The trial of Dead Shant was resumed at 9:30 A. M. Several witnesses were called for the defense, and examined on other points. The prisoner made a statement through an interpreter. He says he was taken to the soldiers, and did not know their purpose; went into camp, and was gathering wood, heard two shots fired, saw the Indian soldiers run toward the brush; asked what the matter was; they shot the Americans and Indians were fighting; went to get my gun, when I found I was

alone, and the American soldiers were charging towards me. I have ten fingers and two eyes, and the Americans accuse me of killing, which I did not do. I never told a lie. If I had shot I would not have come in.

THE PRIZE FIGHTERS AT ERIC. ERIC (Pa.), November 17th.—Both Holden and White, the prize fighters, are here. Some arrests of pickpockets have been made, and sharp watch is being kept on the principals in this affair; but they have not been arrested, and are keeping very quiet.

ANOTHER COMET DISCOVERED. ROCHESTER (N. Y.), November 17th.—Director Swift, of the Warner Observatory, has discovered a new comet (1881 XV), named Casseopaea. It is possible that the stranger is the comet of 1812, which was expected to appear in the month of November. It is in a line between Polaris and the great cluster in Perseus, a little nearer Polaris. This is the seventh comet discovered since January.

MISSOURY CONFERENCE. BOSTON, November 16th.—The formal opening of the Conference of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Societies of the Episcopal Church of the United States took place last evening, with a large congregation. Dr. Bishop Stevens, of Pennsylvania, presided.

THE SMALL-POX SCOURGE. PORTLAND, November 17th.—At Dayton, Vt., there are 63 cases of small-pox, and the disease is assuming alarming proportions. Eleven deaths have occurred in town and in the immediate vicinity. New cases are reported daily. The town is under guard to-day. The Northern Pacific have stopped trains, and all passengers from or to Portland are being carried by the Sound ports are carried via Tenino Junction and Olympia. One new case was reported to-day. A total of three cases, all of which are convalescent. All but one are at the small-pox hospital.

A STRICT QUARANTINE. SEATTLE, November 17th.—At a meeting of the City Council last evening, it was determined to place the Quarantine Act. All travel whatever will be interdicted with Tacoma during the continuance of the small-pox scourge, and that place will be allowed to land at this city, and through passengers will hereafter be compelled to come by way of Olympia. The Commission recommended the City of Seattle to immediately after the meeting. As yet no case of small-pox has occurred in this city since its recent prevalence on the Sound.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT—MARRIAGE. WALLA WALLA, November 17th.—A man named Louis Spagy had his left leg broken badly at the foot of his house, while carrying a load of lumber. The accident was caused by the horse slipping. The injured man is now in the hospital.

ST. LOUIS POLICE BOARD AND THE GAMBLERS. ST. LOUIS, November 17th.—The whole matter of the charge that the Police Board are in collusion with the gamblers, which has given rise to several suits in the Courts and caused the resignation of the Board, has been referred to the Grand Jury.

DAMAGE BY FIRE—FIRST FROST. MARYSVILLE, November 17th.—A fire this morning gutted a cottage on the corner of Fourth and D streets, occupied by Mrs. Leonard and owned by Mrs. W. R. Hudson, of Oakland. The furniture was mostly saved. The loss is about \$500 insured.

SHOCKING RAILROAD ACCIDENT. SAN FRANCISCO, November 17th.—A shocking accident occurred on the coast to-day. A train from San Francisco was passing the junction of the narrow-gauge and Central Pacific tracks, on the corner of Seventh and Webster streets, Turner undertook to jump the train, and in doing so, he was killed. The train was stopped, and the man was lifted out from under it by the switchman. He was carried on a stretcher to the hospital, but he died before he reached there.

COAST AND STATE. A canning factory is to be started on the Ross farm, near Santa Ana. Representatives of Harper's Weekly are sketching in Southern California.

KLAMATH & CO. have reached bedrock in the Andrews River. Siskiyou county, and took \$3,000 in the first two days' work in bottom gravel.

R. Nadeau, of Los Angeles, will in this winter plant about 400,000 foreign grapes and 600,000 Mission vines, making a plump million in one season.

The Carson Index reports that R. L. Duncan, of Nevada, has discovered a new comet, falling morning about 5:30 o'clock. The discoverer says the comet has a well-defined tail.

During the season nearly 75,000 cords of wood have been flumed from the Summit and Nevada, and the lumber is now lying in the vicinity of the flume. For some time past 400 cords a day have been carried to Virginia.

Apex, Santa Cruz county, is looking up as a lumbering point. The depot is full of wood and pickets, and it is rumored that not later than next spring several sawmills will be put up and started on the ridge east of the town.

Some careless person started a fire in one of the numerous canyons southeast of Hayward last Wednesday, and the flames burnt over a large space of country. John Dobbs had 250 acres of stubble burnt and a great amount of fencing destroyed.

We learn that there have been three deaths from small-pox near Davisville. These cases were located about midway between Davisville and Dixon. There are five or six families afflicted with small-pox in a light form. No cases have been discovered in Davisville, and the public health has suspended, and every precaution is being used to avert this frightful epidemic.

It is hoped and believed that a further spread of the disease will be prevented. (Woodland Democrat.)

The Monterey Democrat of November 5th has the following: "Friday night of last week the barn of Albion Day, renting from Frank Dunn, near Soledad, was fired, and with its contents totally consumed. The building contained 100 tons of hay, 50 barrels of wheat, 2 fine mules, 8 horses and various farming implements—all being of the esteemed value of \$3,000. The fresh tracks of a horse being seen running up in a fence close to the barn, and thence the footsteps of a man from the same spot to the burned building and back, leaves no doubt as to the cause of the fire."
