POLICE COURT.—Judge Henry having sufficiently recovered from his recent illness, presided in the Police Court yesterday. The session was short and quiet, but quite busy. Chase was given and the thief captured before he had run a block. When he had been taken in hand, he was asked why he committed the theft, he replied, without any apparent concern or regret at the matter, "I help like tea." THE IRISH QUESTION.

The Reception of Hon. T. P. O'Connor Last Evening—Banquet.
Hon. T. P. O'Connor, M. P., who arrived in this city yesterday, was received by committees appointed for the purpose. Regret was expressed and felt that his colleague, Mr. Healy, M. P., the other Irish envoy, did not accompany him, he having been called to the southern country. A mass meeting of citizens had been arranged for at the theater in the evening, to be held under the auspices of Dillon Branch of the Irish National Land Leagues of this city. At an early hour the theater was filled from pit to dome with people. Many were unable to gain seats, and large numbers stood. The stage was handsomely decorated with evergreens, flowers, plants, and the flags of the United States and of Ireland. On one side of the stage was a cartoon representing Liberty bleeding, on the opposite side of Freedom imploring. In the center of the platform was a banner bearing these words: "Spread the Light—Welcome O'Connor and Healy." The Artillery Band played while the people assembled.

The President of the meeting, Mayor Brown, when introduced, said he felt highly honored to be called upon at this time to preside over such an assembly, and to be accorded the pleasant duty of introducing such a distinguished gentleman as the Hon. T. P. O'Connor, member of the British Parliament. Mr. O'Connor said the object of his appearance was to explain something of the situation in Ireland, and to urge upon the Irish League, which he proposed to transform 600,000 tenants on Irish soil into 600,000 owners of the soil. [Applause.] There had been many terms of vituperation against the League, and such as he, who advocated its cause; so much had he been contumacious that he had been obliged to undergo an examination of his conduct to see who he really was. [Laughter and applause.] He humbly described a gross caricature of the League, which had been printed in the Standard. The object of the League had been denounced as infidelity, communism, socialism, etc. It is said in America you have 19,000,000 farms, and about every one owns his own farm. [Applause.] So in France they own the soil, and in Germany they own the soil, and in a great number of other places. In matter of fact it is the rule and not the exception that the land should belong to the owners and they should be the benefitted. The course of landlordism turns the garden into the desert. In Ireland we want the Government to say to the landlord, "Get out, and we will pay you to get out, and set up a system by which the tenants shall pay for what they get, and at the end of 25 years they shall have the land themselves on this earth." [Applause.] What is the result? The result is that the land is being sold, and the doctrine Michael Davitt preached shall become the law of the land. [Applause.] We are going to do it. Why? Because the landlords themselves are coming to our way of thinking. He described the condition of the Irish tenants, and said that the Land Courts were reducing rents from £2,000 to £3,000 a year, so far as all who went to them were concerned, and that the rent was being reduced from £3,000 a year to £2,000 a year. [Laughter.] So, the landlords, being men of sense, saw they were being ground out, and they were becoming millionaires, they adopted resolutions (reading): "That the interest of landlord and tenant alike require the purchase by the State of the land, and that the tenants of those landlords who are unwilling to occupy the position to which they have been relegated by the Act of 1880, should be sold to them." [Applause.] Following these came volunteer toasts. The toasts were pointed, not unprovoked by the Irish, but they were not unprovoked by the English. At a late hour the company broke up.

GOSSIP MEETING.—The special Gospel meetings which have been held during the present week in the various city churches have been fully attended and marked with continued interest and many conversions. The Gospel temperance meetings held in the City building, on Fourth street, were being well attended. The English-speaking meetings to close with one on Monday at 3 o'clock, and another to-morrow at the same hour, in St. George building. The ladies' Christian League, which is making arrangements to open a coffee-house and reading-room at some place in a week. The Irish prisoners' meeting, which is to be held this evening in the basement of the Congregational Church, when it is expected the organization will be completed, and officers elected. If the conditions of all members of evangelical churches, or those of good moral character, are eligible to membership, and ladies may also be admitted.

FIRE YESTERDAY MORNING.—A small house, located at Twelfth and S streets, was burned down between 3 and 3 o'clock yesterday morning. Officer Dwyer states that he saw the fire, and at first supposed it to be, from appearance, north of the railroad, but found it at the above location. There are no other houses in the immediate vicinity, and the fire was extinguished by the fire department. The cause of the fire was not ascertained, but it is believed to have been caused by a gas stove. The building was a two-story structure, and was used as a dwelling. The fire started in the kitchen, and spread rapidly to the other parts of the building. The fire department arrived in time to extinguish the fire, but the building was completely destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$5,000. The owner, John Smith, is insured.

As a conclusion a light collation was partaken of and a social hour enjoyed.

The report of Board Overseer S. E. Boyd, of District No. 9, was filed, examined and found correct. Also the report of Overseer R. T. Scott, of District No. 15, was found correct and placed on file. Mr. Blair offered a resolution "that the Clerk of the Board give notice that this Board will not consider any demands against county moneys ordered by a member of this Board, and said order must be attached to the demand." The resolution was adopted. The report of the viewers appointed to lay out a road in District No. 15 was filed, and the same set for hearing on February 8, 1882, at 10 a. m., the Clerk to notify the non-complying land owners.

A claim of R. T. Scott for \$95 was allowed, and the claims of Louis Spillner for rent, P. Sullivan for \$30 and J. E. B. for \$32 64 were rejected. Of the amount allowed to R. T. Scott, \$80 was for right of way for the new public road contemplated in road District which the executed his deed, with remainder in case said land shall cease to be so used, to the said grantor.
