a sad occurrence took place on Sunday morn-

ing at the residence of Mrs. Hannah Johnson

and her husband, Charles L. Johnson, who

is the engineer at Moore & Smith's lumber

mill at Oakes, Cal. His family consisted of

three children, a son and two daughters, all

of tender age. The father had been

working on the bank of the river not

more than twenty minutes when he was

struck by a large log which fell from the

bank and struck him on the head, killing

him instantly. The body was recovered

and taken to the morgue. The cause of

Frightful Affair-A Young Girl Assassinated

By Her Father.

Rock Springs (Wyo.) February 16th.-

Before the coroner's jury, who are investi-

gating the murder of John Lushan, who

was killed while sitting near a window Sat-

urday night, Maggie, his eldest daughter, con-

fessed that she did the shooting. She also

implicated her mother, her sister Anna and

the latter's lover, a young man named Birch.

The girl testified that it had been agreed

between them some time ago to "put the old

man out of the way" at the earliest oppor-

tunity. C. H. Hildreth, the minister, who

when her father came home from a

Farmers' Club meeting, and was about

to sit down, she stepped up behind

him and fired, killing him instantly. The

three arranged the body so as to appear as if

some one had shot him through the window,

while her sister Anna went out and broke

the glass. As to the motive for the crime,

Maggie testified that Birch wanted to marry

Anna, and her father refused. He also did

not provide for them. The mother and

other daughter corroborated this testimony.

Birch at one time lived with the family, and

was driven from the house by Lushan, who

suspected him of criminal intimacy with his

wife and daughter. All the parties impli-

cated are under arrest, and the greatest ex-

citement prevails.

Weather Report.

SAN DIEGO, February 16th.-A

sooty wind, cloudy sky and low barometer

all indicate heavy rain to-morrow. The grass

is becoming green, wheat is coming in look-

ing well, and a few more showers will give

full crop. In the mountain farms are vig-

orously at work planting irrigating ditches.

SUMNER, February 16th.-It commenced

snowing at 11 o'clock this morning, a strong

southwest wind prevailing. All the indica-

tions point to a heavy storm. The barometer

is falling rapidly.

DIXON, February 16th.-It commenced

snowing at 11 o'clock this morning. The bar-

ometer is falling, and there are indications

of a good storm. The growing crop is in an

excellent condition and advancing rapidly.

OROVILLE, February 16th.-A very cold

rain is now falling. Thermometer 46°. Snow

now lies on the ground here at 600 feet above

the level of the river. The rainfall for the season

is 11.44 inches. Over two inches has fallen

since last Friday. The crop prospects are

very fair, and outside prospects quite encour-

aging. The different mountain ridges this morn-

ing are covered with a heavy snowfall.

set in, with showers of rain and hail. The

weather has been falling, and there are indica-

tions of a good storm. The growing crop is in an
