FROST AND THE NORTH WIND.

The Cultivation of the Orange in this City—How to Favor Certain Plants. S. H. Gerriah, of this city, whose weather reports frequently appear in this paper, and who has given much attention to meteorology, writes on the now interesting topic of the weather of this winter, and concerning the proper treatment of certain fruits and plants.

There exists still a profound and lamentable disagreement, in most of our speculations between the abstract sciences and the concrete science, or between theory and practice, says Professor Andre Levy, in "Agricultural Meteorology." In the Ground-URON of November 7, 1881, I stated in an article on the irrigation of orange trees during the prevalence of north winds, that the process would, would be very favorable to citrus fruits, as we were blessed with early rains.

It is anticipated; no damage from frost, and heavy frosts has resulted. The same rule will apply to other plants, with the exception of the cacti. And it may be regarded as an axiom—moisture and warmth are the enemies of frost and cold and death.

This winter has been very favorable for experiments on the advantages of the moist south winds over the north winds, as we have had a very cold south wind and the north winds have congealed water at a remarkably high temperature. Mr. Charles Martin notices the confluence of dry winds with the moist, cause favorable to citrus fruits, as we were blessed with early rains.

THE COMING TRANSIT OF VENUS. Venus is morning star until the 20th, when she comes into superior conjunction with the sun, and is then evening star for the rest of the month. She easily wins the place of honor among the planets, for when, after conjunction, she passes to the eastern side of the sun, she enters upon a career which, as its close, will culminate in the greatest astronomical event of the year, and perhaps the greatest event of the century. This event of transcendent importance is the transit of Venus on the 6th of December, 1882. She then reaches her inferior conjunction, passing between the earth and the sun, and is projected on the sun's disk like a round, black spot. The transit will be visible throughout the Western Hemisphere, so that our side of the globe is the fortunate one this time in regard to locality; and the transit in this locality will continue for six hours. It seems like announcing an event a great while before its occurrence, but astronomers will not let the globe have long sounded the busy notes of preparation. It is said that some of them have been 25 years getting ready for this long-anticipated transit.
