Thomas Ryan has been elected by the Republicans of the Third Kansas District for re-election to Congress.

Mrs. J. E. Durhan and Mrs. Clara Loucks were seriously injured near Martinez yesterday by being thrown from a buggy.

A fire at Tucson, A. T., yesterday, destroyed a firm store, with most of its contents.

The Senate has confirmed the nomination of William H. Brown as Surveyor-General of California.

He says that France and Germany are much less, but not necessarily, as flour, beef, mutton, eggs, poultry, fat, potatoes, etc., are much higher in the United States. Servants' wages are much less, and rents about the same as here.

BOYCOTTING AS A POLITICAL WEAPON.

It cannot be ignored by such as study the times in which they live that the practice known as "Boycotting" is being gradually adopted by the masses of the people to an extent which threatens grave consequences to society.

A disposition is growing up to apply this thingy dinged form of coercion wherever it seems possible to do so, and political and other organizations are taking up the new weapon with an apparent unconsciousness of the effects of their action.

This is the "Boycotting" which is called "League of Deliverance," proposing to solve the Chinese problem by refusing to have commercial intercourse with anyone who employs Chinese.

In this particular case espionage is to be added to the "Boycotting." Spies are to be sent around to ascertain who employ Chinese, and then these are to be fined, threatened, and in default of submission ostracized.

Not is this the only instance of the adoption of "Boycotting" which has occurred recently. An organization calling itself the "Loyal League of California" has been formed in San Francisco for the purpose of organizing the Sunday law.

It has adopted a pledge which reads "that the members of this League shall not, directly or indirectly, patronize any dealer or tradesman who shall violate the Sunday law by transacting business on Sunday." The projectors of this organization hope to bring the Sunday law to take the solemn pledge.

Again, in the Anti-Debris campaign, strenuous efforts have been made to "Boycott" those who should refuse to take the side of one party or the other.

In fact the cases in which this principle is sought to be availed of are becoming so numerous that it is difficult to inquire to what all this disposition toward coercion is tending.

For it must be recognized that "Boycotting" is coercion, and of the most rigorous and tyrannical kind. It is, as applied here, an attempt to force people to change their views by depriving them of the means of living.

It is not to be denied that the practice has been advanced so far as to be able to slough off the Bourbon Protection system, and it will have to be admitted that the former power placed among the nations.

Should the adopt Free Trade, however, the United States and China will be the only thoroughgoing Protectionists in the world, and as persistence in the silver currency will surely force us to adopt the Chinese currency system also, perhaps this is only part of the general tendency of the times.
