Guilean's Counsel Still at Work. WASHINGTON, June 21.—Read, Guilean's counsel, has presented a petition to the District Supreme Court, asking a rehearing on purely technical grounds.

Departure of Capitalists. PHILADELPHIA, June 21.—A large number of capitalists and mine operators left here yesterday for the Pennsylvania Railroad, for the purpose of completing the Sierra mines, Lake valley, New Mexico, and the Colorado mines.

Thoroughbreds for Europe. NEW YORK, June 21.—The Spirit of the Times says that to-morrow James K. Keene will ship to England a number of two-year-old thoroughbreds.

Horrible Condition of a "Home for Children." NEW YORK, June 21.—Inquiry into the many deaths of children in the Manhattan Home showed that the little ones were dirty and covered with vermin, and the meat was not always fresh.

Boiler Explosion. RUCKELVILLE (Va.), June 21.—An explosion in a sawmill at Ruckelville, one and a half miles from the town, killed one man and badly injured several other workmen.

Death of an English Nobleman. LONDON, June 21.—George Henry, third Marquis of Gough, equerry to the Queen and Lieutenant-General of the army, is dead, aged 57 years.

Emigration Restricted. BROADY, June 21.—The authorities are restricting the emigration of Russian Jews, and the refusal to provide with passports are being sent back.

Threatened Official. DUBLIN, June 21.—It is stated that Clifford Lloyd, special magistrate for Clare, has received a letter from the Home Office warning him that he will be killed if he does not quit the duties of his office.

Seeking their Fortunes. ST. JOHNS (N. F.), June 21.—The Phycoan has arrived from Queenstown with a large number of immigrants, mostly Germans, for the United States.

Railroad Property Burned. QUEBEC, June 21.—The Grand Trunk Railway station and sheds and the Dominion, Ontario and Quebec Immigration sheds and offices at South Quebec were burned to-night.

High Water in the Mississippi. NEW ORLEANS, June 21.—The Mississippi river is very full and declining slowly at Vicksburg. The decline here since the highest point, March 27th, is only twenty-six inches.

Summer Cured in with Frosts. CHICAGO, June 21.—Specials from northern and central Wisconsin indicate that summer was ushered in yesterday morning with heavy frosts, but that no damage resulted.

Sale of Blooded Cattle. HARRISTOWN (Ill.), June 21.—The blooded cattle sale of Pinkney, Thomas & Smith, yesterday, resulted in an aggregate of \$18,530 for 69 animals, an average of \$244.

The Tariff in Mexico. CITY OF MEXICO, June 1st.—A decree abolishing the exportation duties on gold and silver coin, bars and ore, and increasing the importation duties on all foreign goods, is published by the executive.

A pair of cruel London parents tried to stop their girls from keeping late hours by cutting off the hair of the young ladies. The papa was summoned before a magistrate, who, after remarking that the old gentleman had no right to disgrace his daughters, bound him over to keep the peace with them and toward their hair for three months.
