THE CITY TAX CASES IN COURT.

The Superior Court, Judge Deason presiding, was occupied most of yesterday in the argument of the suits instituted at the instance of the Board of Trustees to collect the city taxes for the year 1881.

It was argued on behalf of the defendants, on demurrer, that the plaintiff makes in the case no claim for the taxes; that there is no authority to levy more than one per cent tax for city purposes.

In reply to all these points, counsel for plaintiff filed the provisions of the city charter, showing that the name of the city is "the people" in suits of this character; also the provision of the charter which provides for the levying of a tax for the year 1881.


