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PACIFIC SLOPE.

Sudden Death in Stockton—Cold Weather—Republican Delegate Elected in Idaho—Highway Robbery at Merced—Another Earthquake Shock—Murdered, Robbed and Thrown Into a River—Cutting Affair at Santa Rosa—Election Returns—Suicide With a Shotgun—Etc.

Official Canvass of Election Returns—Banquet to Congressman Pace—The "Denk" Roll of the Police Court—Complaint of a Wife's Cruelty—Hemphill Washed Downward and Broken—The Le Roy Estate—Successor to Hemphill Chosen—Etc.

THE RECENT ELECTION. SAN FRANCISCO, November 13th.—The official canvass of the recent election has been completed. The Republican State ticket has a majority of 18. Tally sheets show 48 of the county ticket, the Republicans having the County Attorney and the Board of Supervisors. Steele (Rep.) is elected to the Senate, and Starke to the House. The following result: For Governor—Steele, 719; Democrat, 689; Congressmen at Large—Glascow 729, Sumner 726, Edgerton 438, Morrow 442; Congressmen at Large—Steele 719, Democrat 689; For Joint Senator—Spencer 727, Merritt 443; For Assemblyman—Crumpton 771, No. 23.

LAKEPORT, November 13th.—The official count of election returns of Lake county was completed today, with the following result: For Governor—Steele, 719; Democrat, 689; Congressmen at Large—Glascow 729, Sumner 726, Edgerton 438, Morrow 442; Congressmen at Large—Steele 719, Democrat 689; For Joint Senator—Spencer 727, Merritt 443; For Assemblyman—Crumpton 771, No. 23.

AUBURN, November 13th.—Place county official canvass for the Board of Equalization, 1,554 votes, Morehouse 1,241; Democrat 313. Last night was the coldest of the season. The frost was heavy, the ice this morning being from one-quarter to half an inch thick. The grapes on the vines must have suffered, but most of the crop has been picked, and yields far beyond expectations.

MERCED, November 13th.—This morning there was a heavy frost here, killing tender vegetation and causing the trees to cast their leaves. The wind was from the west on Saturday morning last, but was too light to affect vegetation. The weather is now cold and clear, with a wind from the west.

STOCKTON, November 13th.—This morning, about 8 o'clock, James E. Wilson, a paper-maker at work for Badger & Bro., went into his employer's store, and was talking with several there, suddenly fell against the stove and died. The deceased was a native of New York, 37 years of age, unmarried. He was a member of Stockton Lodge, No. 11, I. O. O. F. The cause of his death was cerebral apoplexy.

Highway Robbery in Merced. MERCED, November 13th.—A highway robbery was committed on Front street, in Merced, last night. A man named John, of Mariposa county, being the victim. He says he was attacked by three men, knocked down, and \$25 taken from his person—all the money he had with him.

A Child's Narrow Escape. SONOMA, November 13th.—On Saturday afternoon the third son of Mr. L. Brennan, an Italian, fell from a heavy load of wood, and was run over. Though one wheel passed over his leg and arm, no bones were broken. Shaken up again.

MENDOCINO, November 13th.—There was another earthquake felt along the coast here last night about 12 o'clock. It was quite sharp.

Aurora Borealis. VICTORIA, November 13th.—There was a brilliant aurora borealis here this morning, beginning at 12 o'clock. About 2 o'clock the streamers reached out over the tail of the comet.

Train Delayed. LOS ANGELES, November 13th.—The train from San Francisco, due here at 8 this morning, did not get in till 11 o'clock. The delay was owing to a landslide in the Tehachai mountains, caused by the recent rains.

Second Trial of Clarence Gray for the Murder of Theodore Gray. REDWOOD CITY, November 13th.—The second trial of Clarence Gray, for the murder of Theodore Gray at Santa Barbara, was commenced in the Superior Court this morning. The jury consisted of Judge, Mr. Bishop, Mr. Madoc and Fitzpatrick appeared for the defendant, and Messrs. Thomas Johnson and Deputy District Attorney appeared for the people. The defendants asked for a continuance, on the ground that some of their witnesses were not present; but the motion was denied. It was then agreed to try the case this afternoon. The testimony of the absent witnesses should be read from their testimony given at the former trial. The selection of a jury then commenced, and at 6 o'clock the Court adjourned, having secured three juries during the day. Following are the jurymen accepted: Samuel Hall, J. Boyce and John Donald.

Chinese Cutting Affair. SANTA ROSA, November 13th.—In a Chinese cutting affair, which occurred last night, a Chinaman was dangerously cut by three of his countrymen, who escaped. A reward of \$200 is offered by a Chinaman here for their arrest.

Commissioner Cone's Barn Burned. REP BLUFF, November 13th.—Yesterday morning the barn of Commissioner Cone, on the ranch, about four miles east of here, was burned. The barn contained 70 horses and mules, 50 saddle horses, 200 tons of hay and 75 tons of barley. Other buildings adjoined the barn, but they were saved. The fire caught in the center of the barn, which was 100 feet long, in a room where two farm hands were sleeping. Fifty animals were burned to death and several more will have to be killed. Mr. Cone leaves for San Francisco this morning to purchase mules. The total loss is \$50,000; insurance about \$5,000 on the mules.

A Boy with a Pistol. STOCKTON, November 13th.—George Ishell, a lad 10 years of age, was dangerously wounded yesterday by a shot from a pistol which he carried about his person. He is now about 15 years of age, and a stranger to the city. Ishell was walking with a boy named John, who was shot in the chest. The boy who shot him was not identified. The ball entered the right side of the chest, and lodged in the kidneys. The boy who shot him is now being sought by the police.

NEVADA. Refusing Treasurer Pardoned. CAMDEN, November 13th.—Charles, the defaulting Treasurer of Storey county, sentenced to ten years' imprisonment, was pardoned today. His fine of \$27,000 was not returned.

IDAHO. Republican Delegate. POINE COUNTY, November 13th.—Singler (Rep.) for Delegate has a majority of 3,110 heard from. It will reach 3,500 when all the returns are in.

OREGON. A British Ship in Trouble. PORTLAND, November 13th.—The danger to the British ship "The Nebo" was much greater than indicated by the manager Dispatch a few days ago. Shortly after being towed to sea a terrific gale took away her foremast and masted her. She became unmanageable, and drifted northward to Shoalwater Bay. The next morning the tug Pioneer went out to bring in the Nebo, and was signaled to steam to Shoalwater Bay, as the Nebo had signaled. Send us a tug, or we are lost. Notwithstanding the very heavy sea, the Pioneer got a hawser to the Nebo and towed her about eighteen hours out of sight of land, and she got about to San Francisco. The next day the Pioneer returned to Astoria, got a supply of coal and started to find the Nebo for the purpose of towing her to San Francisco for repairs. Up to last night neither ship nor tug had been heard from. The Nebo is expected to
