

DOMESTIC NEWS.

Brewster and Marshal Henry.

WASHINGTON, November 29th.—The Department of Justice to-day gave to the public a copy of the interview between Attorney-General Brewster and District Marshal Henry, held at the former's office on July 23d last, immediately after drawing for jurors in the case of the late Marshal Henry.

St. Louis, November 29th.—Last night Frank H. Ingelhart, a highly connected young man, left a house of assignation with a woman closely veiled, who had been lying in wait for him, and only slightly wounded him.

WASHINGTON, November 29th.—The annual report of the Treasurer of the United States says that the receipts of the public debt during November will reach \$9,000,000.

The Vermont Legislature.

MONTPELIER, November 29th.—The bill making the enforcement of the liquor law more stringent was killed in the Senate, and the Legislature adjourned sine die.

The Nebraska Liquor Law.

OMAHA, November 29th.—The high license liquor law works well. The saloons have been reduced in this city from 120 to 85. The dealers themselves are practically a conspiracy to expose non-licensed vendors.

Congressman at Large.

RICHMOND (Va.), November 29th.—John S. Wise has been awarded the certificate of Congress.

Kellogg's Residence.

NEW ORLEANS, November 29th.—J. H. McHenry has submitted a brief to Governor McComb, denying his claim to be an inhabitant of Louisiana within the meaning of the United States Constitution, or a resident of the State.

The Railroad War.

CHICAGO, November 29th.—The following breezy cable has been received at the Associated Press office: "The Chicago and North Western Railroad is in a state of anarchy."

Little Rock (Ark.), November 29th.—Much comment is caused in railroad circles by a letter from President Parrott, of the St. Louis and Texas Narrow-gauge Railway, stating that when completed passengers fares on the road should be reduced to three cents per mile, and the equalization of freights to less than the local traffic.

The Chicago Murder Case.

CHICAGO, November 29th.—In the Sturza murder case, the evidence all tended to show human treatment of the defendant by Stiles, and made a strange picture of womanly pity and devotion and prodigal life and character.

The E. S. Training Ship.

BOSTON, November 29th.—The United States training ship, Jamestown, arrived today, six days from New York, after a stormy trip. A large proportion of the boys were frost-bitten, and many are on the sick list with colds and coughs.

Collision of Trains.

PORT JERVIS (N. Y.), November 29th.—The express train on the Erie Railway, two hours late, ran into the rear of a freight train near Greenwood today. The conductor of the freight train was killed, and the engineer and fireman of the passenger train were seriously hurt.

Melville and His Daughter.

PHILADELPHIA, November 29th.—The wife of a famous circus leader by Judge Thayer on Friday last, commanding Engineer Melville to produce his eldest daughter in Court, was made returnable to-day. The case was called a little before noon, and by request of James H. Hervey, Melville's attorney, it was dismissed, as the custody of the child had been obtained without law.

Page on the Political Situation.

NEW YORK, November 29th.—Congressman Page of California was cited yesterday morning. He said his defeat was due to the decision of the Governor, who left the Republican ranks in a body in consequence of the Sunday-law plank in the platform. He is confident that California will be found on the Republican side in 1884, although the current opinion is slightly discouraging.

Murder and Suicide.

CORNING (Me.), November 29th.—This afternoon North Newport was startled by three pistol shots in rapid succession. Shortly afterwards a horse attached to a carriage ran away to the yard of John Dodge. In the carriage Miss Nellie Prilly, of North Newport, lay dying; shot in the left temple. Charles Crowell jumped from the carriage and dropped before reaching the horse. He had a bullet hole in the right temple. Both died inside of thirty minutes. They were married, and did not recover consciousness. Crowell, who was the school-teacher in St. Albans, where Miss Prilly was teaching, took her to her home in North Newport to spend Thanksgiving.

Murderous Water.

CHICAGO, November 29th.—A colored waiter, Bill Allen, alias John Dalmas, a colored waiter, shot and killed policeman Wright to-night, and killed policeman Jones, another waiter, with a hammer, inflicting probably fatal injuries.

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
