

New York, December 9, 1882. The jingling of the sleigh-bells is mingling with the chime of the golden wedding bells; society is beginning to prepare for its usual winter saturnalia, and already our city is putting on a carnival aspect.

For wedding dresses, for the time, ottoman, reps silk is the favorite, though plain satin retains its hold upon the fancy of brides who entertain a conservative fondness for satin, as the most proper material for the wedding robe; while it is not unusual to see in the robe combinations of satin brocade, or velvet brocade, and in some instances ottoman reps, ottoman velvet brocade (a new and elegant variety of silk manufacture), and plain satin, all have part in the creation.

Satin kedivie (a new manufacture), and other varieties of the cheaper grades of soft satin, with white silk grenadine, silk epinglene, nun's veiling, and other of the silk and the woolen muslins, are used for bridal robes; and these muslins are almost exclusively used for bridesmaids' dresses. The style of making differs from that of the heavy silk stuffs, in that the muslins encourage much draping, lending themselves willingly to soft folds, and being particularly delightful in bouffant arrangements.
