"Grass Cutting Short"—Continuance
of the Drought.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 8.—The treasurer of the Board of Supervisors, John C. Hays, today announced that the funds in the city treasury are fast running low, and that the Board of Supervisors will have to consider the possibility of raising money to meet the city's needs.

The San Francisco Water War.—Shortly after the Board of Supervisors met today, the Board of Public Works, which is in charge of the water supply, announced that it had decided to raise the price of water to meet the cost of the water.

Isolation Disolved.—The Board of Supervisors today decided to discontinue the isolation of the Chinese in the city, and to allow them to live in their own homes.

The Hon. H. H. Hays.—The Hon. H. H. Hays, treasurer of the Board of Supervisors, today announced that he had resigned his position, and that the Board of Supervisors had accepted his resignation.

San Jose, March 8.—At 1:25 this morning a fire broke out in the large two-story wooden building on the corner of J and G streets, occupied by Bennett, Peterson & Co. as a furniture factory. The flames spread rapidly, and the building was completely destroyed.

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THE LEGISLATURE.

Sixtieth Day—Appointments Confirmed by the Senate—The Congressional Appropriation Bill Passes the Assembly.

Yesterday was the last day of the session for the month of March, and both houses held their day and night sessions, but did not finish their work.

The Senate met at 10 a. m., President Daguerre in the chair. The Senate read the report of the Committee on the Appropriation Bill, and passed it by a vote of 18 yeas to 10 nays.

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
