THE LENTINI CASE.

THE EVIDENCE FOR THE PROSECUTION ALL IN, AND THEY REST.

Salvatore Troia, on the Witness Stand all Day—He Tells all About how His Wife was Murdered.

The Lentini case was resumed at 9 A. M. yesterday. The first witness examined was Salvatore Troia. Said he knew John Lentini. His place was eight miles east of the town of Galt.

Cross-examination.—Was born in Syracuse, Italy, in 1820; left his native land for Melbourne in 1849, and came to the United States a few years later; came to California and to Sacramento the year they commenced building the State Capitol; at one time lived in Jackson, Amador county, was married to a Sicilian woman several years ago in Stockton; he and his wife always lived happily together; he loved his wife, and all his acts toward her were those of kindness; he denied having had conversations with his neighbors in which he asserted he had threatened the life of his wife; he declared positively that he never had any trouble with his wife at any time or on any occasion.

Cross-examination of Salvatore Troia resumed.—A great many questions were asked witness about a wife in Italy. Sam said that four years before he was married to Margareta the woman he lived with in Italy. This information he obtained from his older brother, Bastiano, who came from the old country years ago. Bastiano is now a resident of Lima, Peru. Had known Lentini since he married Mrs. Troia's sister. Troia obtained the license for Lentini and was present when they were married. For the first six months of their marriage Lentini and his wife lived with Troia. Troia often defended himself, one arm being useless on account of rheumatism. Lentini was leading a horse behind a wagon. Mrs. Troia kept Lentini's little girl about two years and a half. Troia was home all day the day of the homicide. Mr. Egerton had Troia repeat the statement he made in his direct examination regarding all the incidents attending the murder. He never told any one that the little girl was shot in the arm at the same time that Margareta was killed.

Mr. Egerton offered to read the testimony given by Salvatore Troia at the Coroner's inquest. Judge Holl objected to its being introduced; said at the time the evidence was taken before the Coroner's inquest there was no official interpreter present; that Troia understood and spoke the English language very imperfectly and was not furnished an interpreter. Judge Holl was willing that it should be used as a witness, but in no other way.

The objection was sustained. Afterwards it was agreed that the evidence spoken of should be read to Troia in the Italian language by the interpreter. Each of the interpreters was given a copy of the document, and after a long party between them, Judge Holl, in order to expedite business, withdrew Troia, and Henry Egerton read the document to the jury.

Frank Troia also testified to its being in Sacramento county.

CHANGED EVERY DAY FOR THE MECHANICS STORE.

The Court-room yesterday was crowded with spectators during the time that Salvatore Troia was giving his testimony in the Lentini murder case.

The Board of Trustees met yesterday morning and approved the report of the City Engineer and the report of the City Auditor.

The cases of Freehill vs. Porter, and Davis vs. Porter, were set for trial in the Supreme Court to-day at San Francisco, but owing to the large number of cases on the bank calendar the Court ordered them continued until the next Sacramento term of the Court.

The Chinese who live beyond the north levee complain of the shooting range used by the military companies of this city. They say the marksmen "scatter" too much, and that it is not safe to live in that neighborhood with a circuit of half a mile of the range when the boys are shooting at targets.

In one of the public schools yesterday there was given a question to which this answer was made: Comparative anatomy and physiology of the human body, and the functions of the organs of other animals than man. At this time spoke a youngster who should be thanked and put to bed: "Please mamma, we are not at school, we are at home. The teacher's report was not heard."
