The Presidency of the Senate. WASHINGTON, January 11th. - It has been decided that Senator Anthony shall be elected President pro tempore of the Senate, with the understanding that immediately upon his election he shall resign, and another Republican Senator be chosen in his stead.

WASHINGTON, January 11th. - The subcommittee of the House Committee on Public Lands, which has referred the question of the order in which land-grant forfeiture bills should be considered, reported that the consideration thereof will be begun immediately following the adjournment of the House.

The Labor Convention. PHILADELPHIA, January 11th. - Treasurer Lennin, in a new report, referred to the matter to be discussed by the Labor Convention on Saturday, said: "We do not expect to nominate a candidate for the Presidency, but to discuss the conference which will be held in New York."

Shocking Death of a Woman. BALTIMORE, January 11th. - Mrs. Mary Hubbard, a widow living near Federal Hill, committed suicide last night by burning herself to death. She had been very melancholy since her husband died several years ago, and once before tried to set fire to her house.

The Cable System in the East. CHICAGO, January 11th. - The New York Rapid Transit Commissioners, who have been investigating the cable system here for several days, with view to introducing it, advisedly in New York and Brooklyn, have been shown all the advantages claimed for the system.

London Gossip. NEW YORK, January 11th. - Cable dispatches have the following gossip: The Queen will not open Parliament in person. Business Failures. NEW YORK, January 11th. - Business failures for the past seven days in the United States and Canada and Provinces were 333, against 348 for the previous week.

The Jewish Question in Russia. St. Petersburg, January 11th. - The Senate has decided to endeavor to obtain the immediate abolition of the anti-Jewish laws passed in 1852.

Fire and Loss of Life. OSTEND, Belgium, January 11th. - A fire in this city today destroyed a large quantity of wool, and a portion of the Great Belgian Railway station. One man was killed and three injured.

Fires to be Extinguished. LONDON, January 11th. - The iron molders of Cleveland and Yorkshire, owing to the depression in the pig-iron market, are making arrangements to extinguish the fires in twenty iron furnaces, in the belief that they will thus accomplish an advance in price.

Departure of Count de Paris for Madrid. PARIS, January 11th. - Notwithstanding the expressed wish of the Count de Paris to preserve his incognito in journeying to Madrid, a large crowd of Royalists assembled at the railway depot upon his departure. They handed the Count an address, in the name of the Royalist League, and a few cries of vive le Comte de Paris, and "vive le Roi," were raised. There were four arrests in connection with the demonstration.

Another Chinese Frontiers. KIEL, January 11th. - Another blockade for the Chinese navy has been launched here.

Transferred to St. Petersburg. LONDON, January 11th. - Count Herbert von Bismarck, counselor of the German Embassy in England, has been transferred to the German Embassy in St. Petersburg. The Count leaves London in a week.

The Approaches to Canton Blockaded by the Chinese. HONGKONG, January 11th. - The Viceroy of Canton has notified the foreign Consuls his intention to blockade the northern approach to the city and also to lay torpedoes at the other approach, known as the Macao Reach, which is obstructed by a bridge at the south end of Dane Island. Steamboat companies are notified by their owners to avoid the northern approach.

HONGKONG, January 11th. - The Chinese authorities have blockaded the Canton river between the city and Bogue forts, leaving only a navigable passage ninety feet wide. A call has been issued for recruits for the Chinese army.

Vienna, January 11th. - The work of blockading the Canton river is progressing. A review of gun-firing was held today at the Bregenz forts. Chinese troops are embarking for Hanao.

Liberal Requests. NEW YORK, January 11th. - The will of Felix Astor gives about \$1,000,000 to various charitable institutions in this city. To the Mayor of the commune of France in the village of Lons, near Rheims, has been bequeathed 5,000 francs, for the benefit of the poor of Lons. The rest of the estate is left to relatives and friends in France and Italy.

Murder Confessed. VIENNA, January 11th. - Schenke, who was arrested on a charge of murdering four girls, after promising them marriage, and robbing them, has confessed and his accomplice, named Schlosch, has been arrested.

Pressing Affairs of State. BERLIN, January 11th. - It is reported that important communications are passing between Emperor William and Prince Bismarck. The Emperor's annual winter trip is set off on account of pressing affairs of state.

Chile and Bolivia. LIMA, January 11th. - A truce between Chile and Bolivia has been announced. The conditions do not interfere with the settlement of the Peruvian question. The sum for the maintenance of the Chilean army of occupation is limited to the proceeds from the Molleando Customhouse.

A Successful Defense. BUENOS AYRES, January 11th. - The latest accounts of Montevideo affairs state that the British fleet, which had been blockading the entrance to the harbor of Montevideo, was repulsed by the Argentine fleet. THE MEXICAN DEBT. CITY OF MEXICO, January 11th. - The Times says: The Government has determined to postpone further negotiation with the British bondholders for the present, consequently the steps of Mathewson & Co. through the London Bank of Mexico, and of Robert, Smith & Co. through several English houses, will prove ineffectual.

ICE GORGE IN THE ST. LAWRENCE. CORNWALL (Ont.), January 11th. - A heavy ice gorge in the St. Lawrence river, just below here, caused the high water to rise to an almost unprecedented height, flooding basements of the cotton and other mills, and causing considerable damage. The mills have stopped until the water subsides.

THE WASHINGTON TREATY AND THE FISHERIES. OTTAWA (Ont.), January 11th. - Senator Towland, of Prince Edward's Island, will again bring to the notice of the Government the claims of the fish merchants of that province, for losses through the operation of the Washington treaty, and will urge that these losses be recovered by the Government. The loss of the Washington treaty, valued at \$500,000 from the United States Government for the privileges granted American fishermen by that treaty.
