STATE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE.

Exhibition Building Accepted—Partial List of Purses and Premiums for 1884. The State Board of Agriculture met last evening. Present—Directors Chase, Lakin, Finigan, Green, Shafter, Newton, Coleman and Shippee, President Finigan presiding.

The following resolution was adopted: Whereas, The new Pavilion has been completed, and the State Agricultural Society and the Board of Agriculture have decided to hold an exhibition thereon.

The building was accepted in accordance with the following resolutions: Whereas, The Board of Agriculture has decided to hold an exhibition on the grounds of the State Agricultural Society.

The Board concluded to offer the following premiums for the most extensive, perfect and varied exhibition of farm products, exclusive of live stock, as follows: The sum of \$600, to be divided into four premiums, as follows: \$300 to the first, \$150 to the second, \$100 to the third, and \$50 to the fourth.

The Secretary was directed to communicate with the Board of the different counties throughout the State and request the appointment of a committee in each county to urge the patrons to make a county exhibit at the State Fair.

The following races were ordered to be advertised: Purses, \$1,000; trotting, mile heats, for two-year-olds.

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THE SULLIVAN COMBINATION.

So much curiosity had been excited by the oft-told tales of John L. Sullivan's feat of prowess that a very large crowd gathered at the depot yesterday morning, attracted by the report that he and his company would arrive in the city by the train from Colfax.

At 4:30 P. M., when the assemblage anxious to receive him was still larger than in the morning, and rivaled in numbers those that had gathered to greet General Grant, General Hancock and other notabilities.

Justice Buckingham, of Washington, yesterday sentenced the five boys convicted on the previous day of assaulting a Chinaman to pay a fine of \$10 each. The boys were: John Armstrong, Rev. T. M. Greaves, Fred Green, Fred Green, and John Wood, who were confined until to-morrow, owing to the absence of their attorney.

The county license cases were up for hearing before Judge Armstrong, in the Department of the Superior Court yesterday. Henry Edgerton and Matt F. Johnson appearing for the people and M. E. Babo for the defense. There were six cases on trial, all tried at once, and the matter was finally taken under advisement by the Court.
