Professor Elliot, of New York City, is conducting some interesting experiments to test the sensibility or insensibility of insects to heat. A dragon fly was taken today to a board and its abdomen severed from the rest of its body. The latter was then left to the insect piecemeal, which it ate with evident relish. The parts which were left to it were eaten, and the insect, in course of time, died. The experiment was repeated, and the result was the same. The insect, in fact, evidently suffering no pain.

The forthcoming report of the Challenger on deep-sea fishes will contain some remarkable forms new to science. Many are luminous, showing very spots upon their heads, like the headlight of the locomotive, or along the fins. It is supposed that these are the means of communication between the fishes, and that they were taken where two or three miles from the surface, where, if a man stood, the pressure would equal a weight of two or three tons on each square inch of his back. The temperature of the water is just below freezing.

The Smithsonian Institution has succeeded in obtaining a fine specimen of the white sea cow, *Diplomaedon*, which will be the only specimen in the United States. The history of the animal is extremely remarkable. About one hundred years ago these animals lived in incredible numbers in the North, but Steller and later explorers waged such a war against them that in thirty years after their discovery they became extinct. The animal was a marine manatee, of enormous size, attaining a length of 35 feet and a weight of several tons.

A correspondent of the *Scientific American* proposes the following method for changing the track of tornadoes: Take one keg or barrel of common rifle or cannon powder, about 100 lbs., as it is going through it is approached by a tornado. Fix it to an artillery priming tube, having a string to it about 100 yards long. Take your position in a large open field, and when the tornado is within 100 yards, pull the string, and the powder will be blown away, and the tornado will be deflected. Wait till the tornado seems to be precisely over the powder, then fire the powder by pulling the string, and the tornado will be deflected.

PLANT LIFE.—It has been shown by Professor Schubert, a Norwegian plant geographer, that most plants in high latitudes produce much larger and heavier seeds than those of the same species in the tropics. This effect he attributes to the prolonged influence of sunlight during the long summer days of the high latitudes.
