Two car-loads of immigrants arrived yesterday and this morning. John Rooney, of Brighton, is slowly recovering from a severe attack of illness.

There was a very large attendance last Saturday upon the funeral of the late Dr. F. W. Hatch.

James T. Touhey has completed his contract for the strengthening of the wing dams on the American river.

W. O. Davis and A. W. Marks, of Folsom, have announced themselves as candidates for Constables of Granite Township.

There was almost a procession of hunters, in vehicles and on foot, going out to town for a little shoot, yesterday morning.

H. E. Barton, a rancher near Latrobe, has lost within the past few months, from some unknown disease, eighteen head of valuable horses.

On Friday night thieves broke into the honoree of Lincoln Satchell at Fifteenth and O streets, and stole a dozen of fine Leghorn chickens.

The militia drill during the late storm at Galt was as follows: 13th, 45 of an inch; 14th, 70; 15th, 103; 16th, 131.

The Democratic meeting at Folsom, Saturday evening, is reported by an "outsider" who happened to be there, to have been a very handsome affair, the attendance being very large.

The Republicans will not hold any county meeting this evening, as all want to attend the great demonstration this evening. The Democratic canvassers will hold a meeting at Antelope.

A thief entered J. S. Cundy's room, at the Hopping ranch, yesterday evening, and stole all of that gentleman's clothing, except the garments he was wearing at the time, the thief taking place while Cundy was in town.

At the embryo stakes race over the Woodland track Saturday, for foals of 1882, but two colts of the number originally entered appeared, and the wire-winner, Geo. Martin and R. H. Newton.

A boy on Saturday last while walking on the hillside near which is suspended from the Third-street bridge, fell into the water, and was rescued by a man who saw him.

The Superintendent of the City Cemetery complains that men and boys are in the habit of depositing their refuse in the City Cemetery. Several monuments have been injured by the vandals.

A petition will be filed with the Board of City Trustees to-day asking that Twentieth street be widened from Broadway through Richmond Grove. This will cut the grove into four parts, necessitate the cutting down of the larger portion of the oak and will spoil it for picnic purposes.

The Governor has pardoned Isaac P. Newton, sent to the State Prison in 1880 from this county for eight years for grand larceny, on condition that he leave the State and never return to this State.
