CALIFORNIA.

Weather Reports.

San Jose, April 17.—Light showers of rain have been falling here at intervals since morning. The weather is cloudy and threatening more rain.

Emigrant Fair Dead.

San Francisco, April 17.—A son of Charles Crocker, when asked to-day if it was true that his father intended to sell the Emigrant Fair, replied: "Father has decided to remain in New York City. He has not yet purchased a house there, because he could not find one that suited him; but he has had a residence on the avenue and taken an office in the Mills building. He has sent word for the family to go on and live there. I presume he intends to remain there. He will still keep his office in New York City, but he will frequently visit, but his permanent home will be in New York City. He goes there because it is more convenient for him to transact his business."

Dehorned Reason—Grasshoppers Threatening—Land troubles—Immigration—Fruit Canners.

Holmes, April 17.—James H. Merrill, a well-known citizen of San Juan, aged 32 years, has been committed to the County Jail on a charge of dehorning a cow. He is said to be a violent man, and is said to be a member of the Southern Pacific Company.

Myriads of young grasshoppers have made their appearance in the lower valleys of the Sacramento and San Joaquin rivers.

The land dispute between native Californians and Portuguese in the Los Muertos valley, twenty miles southeast of Hollister, has assumed a dangerous aspect.

Twelve arrests have been made, two being for assault to murder, and it is feared that bloodshed will result.

A large number of immigrants have arrived in this county and settled on Government land during the past six weeks.

For two weeks the County Surveyor has been busily engaged in making a preliminary land and setting disputed lands. Trouble over land matters is feared in several portions of the county.

The project of starting a fruit cannery here, in which several outside capitalists were interested, has fallen through for the present. The result of this season will determine whether or not the scheme will go on.

Brakenham Charged with Robbery—Small Boys Held for Burglary.

Stockton, April 17.—Last night Sheriff Cunningham and Constable Walter G. Lathrop, brought from Tulare a man named Kelly and another named Kearns, both employed as brakemen on a freight train. They were charged with robbing a freight car of Tulare to Lathrop, and having agreed to pay \$1 for the ride. On arriving at Lathrop it is stated that one of them offered to send the passenger to San Francisco, and the other to stand guard and give him a quarter of a dollar, while the traveler readily consented. When one of the brakemen was seen to get into the car, the other rode to the bay, the other stepped up, presented a pistol, and robbed the Portuguese of a silver watch, which was found in the alleged robber's possession. He was arrested by Justice Moore at Lathrop, and held in \$500 to answer to a charge of robbery.

The body will be brought to this city to-night and remain at the residence of Mrs. MacCrellish, corner of Pine and Mason streets, until the funeral, for which arrangements have not been made.
