**A WISE PHYSICIAN.**

In Mr. Pendleton's speech in New York were some truths that should do his party good. They are medicine to a diseased body. But the trouble is that the party of the Democracy, like a silly child, will not take the doses administered to it. Mr. Pendleton is a wise Democratic doctor. He, of all men, knows the ailment of his party. He intended to administer a needed purgative when he said: "Show me the spoils system and the merit system, and I will show you a man inevitable and to the death. Either may live, but the other must die." Which of them deserves life; which death? He then defined the spoils system. The spoils system "uses the public service to pay the private debts" of unscrupulous and untrustworthy officeholders. "It raises a vast army of officeholders that are military and naval, and of the public treasury" by self-appointed rulers of the people to keep the people under those rulers by debauching the public morals and vitiating popular election. "It spoils public faith, public credit, the public service, and will spoil popular institutions. The system ought not to have a resting-place in our Government." It is enough for honest men to know that the proposition of civil service reform is in all respects the polar opposite of this political debauchery. In the very limited field of its application under the actual law, it has worked much good. It has already improved the public service. But "its scope should be enlarged and extended to all officers whose political opinions are not necessary to the discharge of official duties, and it will be extended." No one will doubt the sincerity of Mr. Pendleton. His party dare not antagonize the element he represents. Nevertheless, as a party, the Democracy is opposed to the civil service reform policy and its leaders will here and there an exception, are merely plotting and working to defeat the reform, and disgust the people with it.

**A LESSON.**

In a township in Pennsylvania there has been a terrible epidemic visitation. The population is but 5,000. Out of that 1,000 people have been stricken with the typhoid malarial pestilence. In three days there were nineteen deaths. Panic prevailed, business was checked and all the town went upon its knees in prayer. The churches had praying seasons for the staying of the plague, but still it went on its rounds. The good people did not realize that God does not intend to help those who fail to comply with the simplest dictates of health. However, they awoke to the truth late. All winter long they filled their garrets, and sheds, and cellars with their back yards, and when spring opened and the sun shined, the miasms of filth rotted and poisonous vapors went up into the air, and the pestilence was the result. When these good people had the cause of their trouble pointed out to them, they got up their marrow-bones, postponed prayer and applied themselves to removing, burning and destroying the filth of the township, which was kept up until nearly morning.

NEW YORK, May 5th.—This morning two buildings, Nos. 55 and 57 Atlantic avenue, Brooklyn, fell in with a crash.
