LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

The Board of Trustees.

The City Board of Trustees met in regular session at 10 A. M. yesterday.

Mark Foster, Chief Engineer of the Water Works, made a report for the week ending Sunday, May 31st.

The Street Commissioner was authorized to advertise for bids for the construction of a sidewalk on the north side of K street.

The Street Commissioner was directed to advertise the delinquent list for the grading of K street, from Sixteenth to Twenty-fourth.

J. W. Watt, City Tapper, was granted leave of absence for a couple of months, on account of coming home from the war.

Monthly reports were made as follows: Chief of Police - Arrests, 208; lodgers, 46; meals, 1,048.

Superintendent of City Cemeteries - Number of deaths in the city, 17; stillborn, 2; burials, 15.

Property owners on K street, between Sixteenth and Seventeenth, desire the privilege of filling in that section of the street to the city.

The Trustees paid the demand of \$40.75, presented by the Board of Education for damages done to the building some weeks since by boys stoning the windows during the celebration of the Army of the Republic.

The contract for graveling Third street, from L to P, was awarded to Robert Miller, his bid being the lowest, and notice of award posted on the bulletin board.

A petition for a sidewalk constructed on J street, from Twentieth to Twenty-seventh street, was granted and the order made.

A communication was received from D. Lee, proposing to filter the water pumped into the mains at the water works.

Mayor Brown suggested that the Board select the names of the citizens who are to act as a committee to recommend the manner of celebrating July 4th, the raising of funds for that purpose, and designate the Board of Education to be in charge of the celebration.

Major W. L. Wallace appeared before the Board and made a complaint against the Poundmaster, whom he claims took a horse away from his fourteen-year-old daughter on the street and made her pay \$1 for it before he would surrender the animal.

The Board were unanimously of the opinion that these complaints against the officer are of too frequent occurrence, and promised Mr. Wallace that the matter should be thoroughly investigated.

Mayor Brown announced the death of ex-Mayor Hardenbergh at Oakland on Saturday evening.

Street Commissioner Nielsen moved that the Board attend the funeral, which takes place to-day in a body seconded by Trustee Jones, and under the read and read.

After allowing a large number of bills and ordering them paid, the Board adjourned.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.—The Board met yesterday, all the members present. Minutes read and approved. On motion the Board, by unanimous vote, designated to-morrow at 2 P. M. for the election of Road Overseers.

On motion of Steinman the Board proceeded to an election for two members of the County Board of Education. Mr. Bates nominated Joseph Johnson; Mr. Steinman nominated Miss Josephine Egan; Mr. McMillen nominated J. E. Blanchard and W. L. Willis.

On call of the roll Johnson received two votes, those of Messrs. Steinman and Bates; Miss Egan received three votes, those of Messrs. Steinman, Jackson and Fassett; Blanchard received three votes, those of Messrs. Jackson, McMillen and Bates; Willis received two votes, those of Messrs. Bates and McMillen.

Mr. Blanchard was declared elected. Ex-District-Attorney J. T. Carey having received favorably upon the bill of P. Connolly for \$75, the bill was allowed by unanimous vote. Upon motion of Mr. Steinman the matter of the obstruction across a road in Road District No. 14, near Ellen Wilson's place, was referred to supervisor Fassett, with power to act.
