FEARFUL DEATH OF AN AMADOR COUNTY MINER.

Bloodshed in Sonoma County—Serious Stage Accident—Suicide of a Woman.

Bloody Land Quarrel in Sonoma County.

SANTA ROSA, June 27th.—A telegram was received by Governor King this morning, the effect that a man had been killed in a fight at the Little Geysers, and requested his presence for the purpose of holding an inquest.

The particulars of the affair are very meager but the following information was obtained from a reliable source: William Phillips and the other Paul Miles, both living in the vicinity of the Little Geysers, became involved in a dispute over some land, which took some time to settle that both men went armed. A meeting took place between them to-day. Phillips was armed with a Winchester rifle and Miles with a shotgun.

After some words the result of which was a quarrel, Phillips was killed and Miles fatally wounded. Further particulars cannot be obtained at present. Phillips was well known in this city, having distinguished himself several months ago by stopping a runaway team containing a lady and child, risking his own life in the attempt.

Death of a Pioneer.

SAN JOSE, June 27th.—George George, a well-known pioneer of this city, died this afternoon, after a lingering illness, aged 55 years. The deceased came to San Jose in 1852 and published the "Daily Enterprise," and afterwards the semi-weekly "Telegraph."

He was employed on the Sacramento Union from 1859 to 1862. He returned to this city, and for a number of years has been part owner of the Aurora House saloon. He leaves a wife and seven children.

LOS ANGELES, June 27th.—At 11 A. M. yesterday, a woman, the wife of a butcher living at 19 Railroad street, committed suicide by taking strychnine. Her death is supposed to have been the result of a rash act. She was 26 years of age, and had often late threatened to take her own life. She was said to have been insane.

MENARD, June 27th.—A fire broke out this afternoon at 3 o'clock in a new unoccupied cottage on K street, the property of A. Johnson, but was discovered in time to prevent the destruction of the building. It is thought to be the work of an incendiary.

Practising Medicine Illegally.

SAN JOSE, June 27th.—A. J. Hally, who was arrested for practicing medicine without a certificate from the Board of Medical Examiners, was today held to answer for the same before the Superior Court, with bail fixed at \$100.

The squaws and children are on route to the fort, and will reach San Bernardino ranch to-morrow. This is the band of renegades who attacked Captain Lawton's supply train in Guadalupe Canyon, which they killed three soldiers. Captain Crawford is following the trail of another band leading into the Sierra Madre.
