At Grand Hall, last evening, there was a joint open meeting by the Grand Army Posts and Ladies' Relief Corps of this city.

Grant was mourned by the nation throughout its length and breadth. Every soldier who served under General Grant felt that he has sustained a personal loss.

THE OAKLAND MURDER TRIAL. Testimony of the Wife in the Prindle Case.

[San Francisco Bulletin, July 29th.] In the trial in Oakland of Henry F. Prindle, accused of the murder of Dr. N. L. Buck, yesterday afternoon the wife of the defendant was called to the witness stand.

She testified that she had known her husband for many years, and that she had never seen him with any woman other than herself.

George W. Ficks was the next speaker. He said that the lighting flashed the news around the world that General Grant, the man who had led the army of the United States to victory in the Civil War, had died.

He said that the death of General Grant was a great loss to the world, and that he hoped that the people would honor his memory by doing good.

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SANITARY MATTERS. Interesting Proceedings of the State Board of Health.

The regular quarterly meeting of the State Board of Health was held at the office of the Secretary, Dr. G. Tyrell, on Wednesday evening, there were present Dr. H. S. Orme (President), and Drs. Brice-land, Crocker, Clunes, Cole, Simpson and Tyrell.

On motion of Clunes, the Board decided to subscribe for seven copies of the Smithsonian Report.

The Secretary read a letter from Dr. J. H. Miller of Redding, Shasta county, regarding the duty of unincorporated towns in the matter of health.

The Board decided that while one of its aims and objects is to encourage sanitation and to foster and sustain all efforts in that direction, it did not feel justified in interfering with local authorities in the management of their affairs in such cases.

A communication from Dr. Boughton of Benita, was read, asking the Board to issue a Health Order for that place.

The Secretary stated that he had replied to the petitioner to the effect that the Board had no power under the law to make such appointments.

The Secretary read a communication from Dr. E. H. Fisher, complaining of the sanitary condition of certain mineral springs resorts, and asking that several copies of the circular concerning cholera be distributed.

The Secretary was instructed to write to his next public circular, the report of Dr. H. S. Orme, late of Panama, submitted in a communication regarding yellow fever, and its presence in Mazatlan, Hermosillo and other Mexican towns, and promising to communicate with the Secretary in case he should discover the disease progressing toward California.

The thanks of the Board were tendered to the Secretary Tyrell reported that in accordance with a resolution passed at the last session, he had prepared and printed a circular entitled "Facts for the People Concerning Cholera," of which an edition of 25,000 copies had been distributed.

The Secretary reported that he had had most generously republished the contents of the circular, at his request, without charge.
