WASHINGTON TERRITORY. Discharge of Chinese Employees. SEATTLE, September 22.—There is nothing new in the situation here in regard to the Chinese. The attack at the Black Diamond mine Sunday night was made about 10 o'clock. The Chinese had already been discharged by the mining company, and had made every preparation to leave the camp by Monday morning. The attacking party made no attempt to injure them, merely driving them into the woods and burning their cabins. Contents, including their baggage, which they had prepared for their journey, all the mining company have discharged. The Chinese employees, and the mill companies are doing the same. The Port Bakery Company started to discharge all Chinese employees at the end of the week. A meeting of property holders has been called for to-morrow evening to discuss the matter.
