THE DEAD STATESMAN.

THE ENTIRE COUNTRY MOURNING ITS LOSS.

Messages of Condolence—Tributes to Hendricks' Memory—Arrangements for the Funeral.

INDIANAPOLIS, November 26th.—The flags on all the public buildings here are at half-mast this morning, and persons of means are engaged in putting up insignia of mourning.

WASHINGTON, November 26th.—About twenty Senators assembled at 11 o'clock this morning, upon the invitation of Senator Edmunds, in the Senate Chamber.

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THE SUCCESSION.

What Would be Done in Case of President Cleveland's Death.

The following provisions of the Revised Statutes explain the manner in which a Chief Magistrate would be chosen in the event of the death of both President and Vice-President.

Section 146. In case of removal, death, resignation or inability of both the President and Vice-President of the United States, there is no one, then the Speaker of the House of Representatives, for the time being, shall act as Chief Magistrate until a President is removed or a President elected.

Section 147. Whenever the offices of President and Vice-President shall be vacant, the Secretary of State shall forthwith cause a notification thereof to be made to the Executive and the first Wednesday thereafter the electors shall be called, and at least one of the newspapers printed in each State.

Section 148. The notification shall specify that electors of President and Vice-President of the United States shall be appointed or chosen in the several States, as follows:

First.—If there shall be the space of two months between the date of such notification and the first Wednesday in December then next ensuing, such notification shall specify that the electors shall be appointed or chosen within thirty days preceding such first Wednesday in December.

Second.—If there shall not be the space of two months between the date of such notification and such first Wednesday in December, and if the term for which the President and Vice-President shall be elected were to expire on the third day of March next ensuing, the notification shall specify that the electors shall be appointed or chosen within thirty days preceding the first Wednesday in December in the year next ensuing.

But if there shall not be the space of two months between the date of such notification and the first Wednesday in December then next ensuing, such notification shall specify that the electors shall be appointed or chosen on the first Wednesday in December following.

Section 149. The electors appointed or chosen upon the notification prescribed by the preceding section, shall meet and give their votes upon the first Wednesday in December specified in the notification.

Advices from Pittsburg state that wrought-iron pipe makers, steel-rod makers and makers of Bessemer pig-iron are crowding each other.

The sensation of the hour in Washington is the departure of Mlle. Negerais, the daughter of the Portuguese Minister, who failed to obtain for \$75 received at a charity concert.

It is stated on good authority that the Union Pacific Company has defaulted on the payment of the interest of certain mortgage bonds.

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Another attachment has been served by the State of New York on the King of Siam, his partner, Charles E. Quincy, and also against Mrs. Elizabeth P. Quincy, who is the wife of the King.

Frank B. Sherwin has been discharged from the Albany Penitentiary. He had been sentenced to six months' imprisonment for a crime committed in 1872, when he was President of the Maxwell land grant of New Mexico.

Chief Clerk Youmans of the Treasury, who has sent charges for the purchase of supplies for public buildings under the Treasury Department, has determined that the purchase of supplies must be made at the regular market prices.
