The Board of Supervisors of Sacramento County do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Notice is hereby given that the Board of Supervisors of Sacramento County, California, for the purpose of the killing and extirpation of animal pests in Sacramento County, California, for the term of twelve months, or until the further order of this Board, do hereby:
