HOME AND ABROAD.

WASHINGTON, August 3.-Allison, from the Committee on Appropriations, reported back the joint resolution appropriating \$30,000 additional for the purchase of land for the National Congressional Library.

Plumb objected to the appropriation, and it was placed on the calendar.

Allison also reported back the House resolution to continue the appropriations temporarily.

Plumb and Edmunds objected to its presentation.

Allison asked that the objection be withdrawn, and stated that if the resolutions were passed, the employment of the pension is provided for in the bill which could not be paid for the time intervening between the last day of July and the day when the bill would receive the President's signature.

Plumb declined to withdraw objection. The resolution was placed on the calendar.

Allison, from the same committee, reported back the House amendment resolution, with an amendment from the time from the 23rd of July to 4 p. m. the 4th of August.

Blair objected to the further consideration of the amendment resolution, and it was placed on the calendar.

Blair then called up the report of the Committee on Education and Labor, which gives a pension to Mary J. Nottage.

Whitmore, a member of the Pension Committee, addressed the Senate in support of the veto.

Allison, from the Committee on Appropriations, reported the bill appropriating \$50,000 for the compensation and expenses of the Mississippi River Commission, and the bill for the relief of the Mississippi River Commission.

The Committee on Education and Labor was directed to continue and complete the investigation of the relations between capital and labor.

Cullum moved to proceed to the consideration of the bill to amend the act of the Secretary of War to accept certain lands near Chicago, Ill. Rejected.

The Senate then took up the conference report on the sundry bill appropriation bill.

House of Representatives.

WASHINGTON, August 3.-Willis presented the conference report on the river and harbor appropriation bill, and it was read at length and was agreed to—ayes 121.

Burns submitted the conference report upon the deficiency appropriation bill, and it was agreed to—ayes 120, nays 29, and the House adjourned.

Capital Notes.

WASHINGTON, August 3.-The Cabinet has sent to the President a report on the arrangement of the Departments in anticipation of the speedy adjournment of Congress. The Cutting and Kousnes cases are also considered.

The sundry civil bill, which has been reported by the House, is being considered by the Senate.

The coast survey item inserted by the Senate in the sundry bill is being considered by the House.

The conference on the Northern Pacific bill, and the bill to repeal the prohibition of the National Bank, met this afternoon, and after a short conference, adjourned, having failed to agree with regard to the proposed amendments.

Among the items stricken from the deficiency bill, as agreed upon in conference, is the Senate provision for the payment of government transportation on the Pacific coast.

Edmunds' bill to detach certain counties from the United States District of California, has passed the Senate.

The Cutting Resolutions.

WASHINGTON, August 3.-A member of the Foreign Affairs Committee holding the floor in the Senate, today, stated that to-night that the adoption of the Cutting resolutions, should they pass tomorrow, would be a great relief to the country.

The resolutions, which are in the hands of the President, are as follows: First, to reduce the number of consuls to 100; second, to reduce the number of consular agents to 100; third, to reduce the number of consular officers to 100; fourth, to reduce the number of consular clerks to 100; fifth, to reduce the number of consular interpreters to 100; sixth, to reduce the number of consular translators to 100; seventh, to reduce the number of consular stenographers to 100; eighth, to reduce the number of consular messengers to 100; ninth, to reduce the number of consular drivers to 100; tenth, to reduce the number of consular porters to 100; eleventh, to reduce the number of consular janitors to 100; twelfth, to reduce the number of consular watchmen to 100; thirteenth, to reduce the number of consular cooks to 100; fourteenth, to reduce the number of consular bakers to 100; fifteenth, to reduce the number of consular butchers to 100; sixteenth, to reduce the number of consular carpenters to 100; seventeenth, to reduce the number of consular painters to 100; eighteenth, to reduce the number of consular masons to 100; nineteenth, to reduce the number of consular bricklayers to 100; twentieth, to reduce the number of consular laborers to 100.
