SUEZ CANAL RECEIPTS. PARIS, June 8th.—The annual meeting of the Suez Canal Company was held to-day. The report showed that the year's receipts of the canal were \$1,000,000, and the dividend was declared of 7 1/2 francs per share.

SENATOR STANFORD'S IDEAL. SAN FRANCISCO, June 8th.—Stanford on the subject of co-operation, which appeared in the New York Tribune on May 4th, has been published in a pamphlet form. In its completed state, this dissertation is well worthy of study. It is the addition to the interview, Mr. Stanford meets the objection that his ideas are present but impracticable. He supplements his exposition of principles by a careful study of the methods of the different critics, including the Post, which have pointed out as frankly admitted and the means of overcoming recognized the full force of the united strength working as a unit for a common benefit. To secure this effective combination of labor, the first requisite is intelligence. Mr. Stanford has grasped the essence of co-operative associations themselves as practical schools of business. However crude the ideas of their members may be at first, he thinks that experience is sure to observe a line of skillful direction, strict discipline and active occurrence. The last quality in which such associations will have the advantage of private enterprise, and the capitalist may command greater executive ability, but in the ultimate assistance of the workers he cannot rival the co-operative society.
