PACIFIC COAST. THE HOSTILES THOUGHT TO BE AT SAN CARLOS. A Boy Shoots His Father--Forest Fires--Five Persons Drowned--The First Grapes--Etc.

"GOD BLESS OUR HOME." A Nevada County Boy Shoots One of His "Dad's" Eyes Out. GRASS VALLEY, June 20th.--On Saturday evening Edward Lawrey came into town and surrendered himself to the authorities, saying he had with a gun shot his father, S. D. Lawrey, who, he said, while in an intoxicated condition, went to the house occupied by Mrs. Lawrey--who, since her unsuccessful suit for a divorce, has been living apart from her husband and talked and acted in an abusive manner, so much so that to protect his mother he held a shotgun in his hand, which was accidentally discharged, the contents passing over his mother's head, frightening but not injuring her. He says his father made an attempt to draw his pistol, when he fired the other load at him, though he did not intend to shoot at him, but the effect, one of them, however, entered the right eye, destroying the sight of the wounded man was immediately interviewed to-day. He denies the above, saying that he was on the premises a hundred yards distant, when he heard a gun discharged in the house, and on the appearance of the boy, who excitedly exclaimed that he had almost shot his mother, and when he saw the gun in the father's hand, followed by the almost immediate discharge of the gun, he fired the revolver, which he had just acquired for the purpose of self-defense. The son who did the shooting is about 20 years of age. From the number of other boys who are in the county, the courts of late, caused by Lawrey's drunkenness and cruelty, this affair has not altogether been unnoticed for.

JUBILEE AT THE BAY. Queen Victoria to be Honored by California Englishmen. SAN FRANCISCO, June 20th.--The celebration of the jubilee of Queen Victoria in honor of the fiftieth year of her Majesty's reign will, in many places, surpass all demonstrations of similar character ever attempted in California. Delegates will begin to arrive in the city from all parts of the State to-day, and to-morrow morning.
