THE IRRESISTIBLE LOGIC OF MOB LAW.

The hot blood of passion having now had time to cool in this matter of the unlawful and violent execution of Hong Di at Colusa by a mob, it behooves good citizenship to look at the matter in the calm of reason, and reflect upon the tendency of all such invasions of the law and outrageous interruptions of the course of justice.

On the morning of the lynching of the prisoner, and within two hours after that tragic event, the RECORD-UNION said, while holding the verdict of the jury to have been made in a fit of passion.

There can be no judgment formed defensive of mob violence, that does not outrage the essential elements of our system of safeguards for life and property.

Under that system, and which has the approval of the ages and the highest judgment of the American people, a jurisdiction embodying the loftiest attainments of civilization has been established.

This San Francisco Call, commenting upon the Hong Di case, says: "Accepting Hong Di's statement, his attack upon Weaver was, in a manner, murder of the first degree. Hong Di was not in danger of his life. All his evidence amounts to it being afraid of Weaver."
