LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

City Trustees.
The Board of City Trustees held their regular weekly session at 10 a. m. yesterday.

Dr. Nichols, Secretary of the Board of Health, again called the attention of the Trustees to the fact that garbage dumped within the city limits—a thing that should not be permitted, as the health of the city was imperiled thereby.

C. F. Dillman, representing the City and County Improvement Commission, appeared before the Board and asked the modification of the ordinance forbidding street cars stopping in certain street intersections.

The City Engineer was instructed to prepare plans and specifications for the improvement of K street, from Eleventh to Twelfth streets, and Twelfth from J to L.

F. De Hondt asked for a sidewalk to be constructed on the west side of Front street, between Q and R. This matter also was referred to the Superintendent of Streets.

An order was passed vacating Twenty-ninth street from R to S, including the alley for the new building to be constructed on the east side of R.

The Board awarded the contract for laying the artificial stone pavement around the City Plaza to John McElroy for 14 cents per square foot. He gives a bond of \$1,000 to have the same done in a workmanlike manner and to be torn away and the grounds enclosed by a neat granite curbing to be built by the Carlaw Bros., who were awarded the contract.

Chief of Police Dillman was granted a leave of absence for a week or two. His duties during his absence will be performed by Captain Karcher.

After auditing a number of bills and ordering the same paid, the Board adjourned.

THE INQUEST.

Together in Life, They Were Not Separated in Death.

One of the saddest cases of suicide and murder that ever took place in this State was the killing, on Saturday night, of James W. Patterson by Mattie Allen and her self.

Both young, both in perfect health, both surrounded by a large circle of friends, both tragically ended a feeling of horror, and wherever and under whatever circumstances the tragedy occurred, there was but one expression—that of sadness for the two young lives so suddenly terminated.

Whatever her grievances, she fully avenged them; whatever his errors, he has paid for them with his life. They have gone before a higher Court, where no lawyers are permitted to bulge witness, and where no newspaper scribes are permitted to trace character.

Whatever the cause of the tragedy, the coroner's inquest last evening was in substance the same facts that were given in the coroner's report.

Mattie Allen was born in Lincoln, Placer county, and at the time of her death her age was 24 years, 3 months and 19 days.

Her remains were forwarded to Lincoln county and will be interred in the Lincoln county cemetery at 10 a. m. today.

Descent of a Huge Meteoric Stone.
The Galt Gazette of Saturday last narrates the following: "Dr. T. V.
