THE ASIATIC SCOURGE.

New York, September 23.—The steamship Alesia, which arrived here last night from Marsella, had on board passengers, but Asiatic cholera aboard. Eight of her passengers died on the passage, and on her arrival at quarantine the health officers found four cases. She has sent the Alesia and her passengers to the west bank in the lower bay.

THE GOVERNMENT NOTIFIED.

Washington, September 23.—Surgeon-General Hamilton, of the United States Army, has received a dispatch from New York confirming the press report of the arrival of the Alesia, and that she had cholera on board. The telegram merely announced the facts in the case, as published, without any reference to the Government assistance, and it is thought the quarantine authorities of New York feel confident of their ability to stamp out any further cases of cholera.

C., president of the association, reported the draft of a bill to give prisoners of the war pensions as follows: Ninety days of pay for the first hundred and twenty days, a two-thirds pension, and full pensions to those who served longer. It is proposed to give a day's pay for each day of confinement in prison. This bill will be debated to-morrow.
