LOCAL BREVITIES.

Woodland has added a Hook and Ladder Company to its fire department. Master Tracy Berry, of Shingle Springs, is manager of the telegraph office at Mud Springs.

Judge Armstrong will hear Judge Van Fleet's law calendar to-day at 10 A. M. He will hear his own calendar at half past one this afternoon.

The grading on the railroad now extends about a mile beyond El Dorado toward Placerville, and several hundred Chinamen are being moved further to the front.

The Treasurer of Santa Clara county yesterday paid into the State treasury \$800, the interest on Santa Clara county bonds held in trust for the State school fund.

It is rumored that John Boggs will appoint a meeting of the Board of Prison Directors at San Quentin tomorrow, and claim his seat as a member of that august body.

The Overland Monthly for November publishes as a frontispiece an elegant picture of the Crocker Art Gallery. It also contains a two-page article on Sacramento and the city and county.

Woodland has been figuring on an electric street railroad, but after carefully investigating the different routes has decided on horse power. Horses are slow but they get there all the same.

W. B. Tolbunter has three six-mule teams and two four-horse teams at work on dunes just below Winters. These teams are being built for the purpose of rigging meadows on his ranch, which extends from the town limits some distance down the Humboldt.

English sparrows are becoming quite numerous in this vicinity. A State official, who is something of a naturalist, yesterday remarked that the coming would be the open winter. He bases his prophecy upon the fact that yesterday morning he observed two of these birds building a nest in the Capitol grounds.

They are endeavoring to draw the color line in the school at Davisville. The citizens of that town are talking of building a school-house and bringing to the school a little colored boy. Several white children have been taken from the school by their parents, and they will not attend until the objectionable lad is expelled.

Sacramento is more cosmopolitan than Davisville. The youth here are not prejudiced on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude.

Mrs. Corley, the angelic female from Washington, who attempted to burn up the County Hospital last week, is still at that institution, and if she behaves herself will not be sent back to the Oakland of Sacramento. This female dynamite is in the hospital not for any sickness, but for indignity, and will be bounced in short order to the asylum for the insane, unless any more of her most anarchist theories. She is said to be a "she devil" and will be watching.

There are a few citizens in this community who are continually saying that there is no future for this section. The Nevada Pioneer, in speaking of this class, says: "This is a talk of forming a new party, and its object will be to acquire a lot of land and donate a few acres to each croaker, who will then be compelled to stop giving a black-eye to lands in this section. It is the best of the cheapest way, and we think the desired end will be accomplished, as the loudest-mouthed croakers would never be able to buy any land with their own money."

HIGH LICENSE IN OAKLAND.

The Result of Its Operation Since Going Into Effect. (Oakland Tribune.) Liquor License Inspector King this morning presented to the Board of Supervisors a complete and exact statement of the status and result of the adoption of the high liquor license. It is as follows:

As this table shows, at the time Mr. King presented his report on June 1st there were 250 saloons in operation in the city of Oakland. Of these 38 were closed in the first quarter and 18 in the second quarter, making a total of 56 saloons which have been closed by the operation of the high license, and leaving 194 saloons now openly conducting business.

For the two quarters 195 saloon-keepers have deposited \$120,000 in the City Treasury, and in trust, eighty have paid licenses to the Marshal, increasing the funds in the city treasury by \$80,000. During the first quarter forty saloons and for the second quarter six were arrested, making a total of fifty-one arrests for which bonds have been given.

Should the city with the said \$5,100 in funds will probably flow into the city treasury from this source.

CO-OPERATION. Something of Its Origin, Ancient and Recent History.

In one sense co-operation is as ancient as society. The first tribe that acted together knew that it was better to do so than fight singly. Men recognized that they were stronger before Esop composed his fable of the bundle of sticks. Nimrod and his followers knew that two greyhounds hunting together would run down more hares than four hunting separately.
