It will be noted, also, that these views, in many cases, give the observer a clear idea of the climate and production of the place, by the plants and foliage shown, as the lemon and orange trees, palms, semi-tropical plants, etc.

THE CENTRAL PICTURE

Is taken from a supposed elevation opposite the city and upon the Yolo shore of the Sacramento river. It presents in far better perspective than is usually true of bird's-eye views, a comprehensive and ad-

mirable view of the city from the water front, and including a glimpse of the Yolo shore, to the extreme limit on the east, and from the American river on the north to the uplands on the south. Every prominent building is easily recognizable, and all the churches, public structures, hospitals and parks, larger residences, etc. Chief among these and indicated by figures having reference to a "key" printed below the view, are the Capitol, the works of the Southern Pacific Company, the depot, City Hall, Water Works, fountains, Cathedral, electric light works, Hall of Records, Court-house, Free Library, chief hotels, Masonic Hall, the churches, Armory, theaters, Grammar and High Schools, Old Fellows Temple, Turner Hall, State Exposition building, State Printing Office, Art Gallery, etc.

WEALTH OF FOLIAGE SHADE

That characterizes this city, and is one of its chief attractions. For to have shown our streets as they are, lined with choice shade trees, some almost meeting and overlapping the street, would literally have presented a view of the city being given; to put it in homely phrase - from a bird's-eye view Sacramento cannot be seen for her many trees.

A PRINCIPAL FEATURE

Of the picture is the great stretch of country shown to the east, north and south of the city. Thus, below the Sierra Nevada, from their cool heights in the background, overlooking this semi-tropical valley, and from thirty to seventy miles away, we have the foot and prolific hills and plain lands, known far and wide for their fruit, vine and general agricultural wealth, extending from Colfax on the northeast, and beyond Wheatland on the north, to Galt on the southeast, a distance of over ninety miles. Intermediate between these two extremes are shown New England Mills, Applegate, Auburn, Newcastle, Penryn, Loomis, Rocklin, Wheatland, Sheridan, Lincoln, Roseville, Antelope, Arcade, Orangevale, Placerville, Folsom, Natoma, Roter's, Mayhew's, Enterprise, Brighton, Florin, Elk Grove, Hicksville, Ione, Napa Colony, Clay, Galt, and Franklin.
