A DETERMINED STAND TAKEN BY THE READING STRIKERS.

The Miners Determined to Win or Die in the Last Ditch.

New York, January 17th.—The Mail and Express says of the Reading strike: It is a fact that the strikers have reached an inevitable conclusion drawn to-day from the latest developments. The members of the executive committee of the Reading railroad have clinched the matter by bringing about an understanding between the leaders of the miners and themselves, by which the former are not to return to work, even at an advance in wages, until the grievances of the railroaders are taken into consideration.

A LARGE EMBEZZLEMENT.

The Secretary of a Carbon Company Charged With Defalcation.

Detroit, January 17th.—A sensation in business circles was caused this afternoon when it became known that Charles T. Young, for many years confidential bookkeeper of the Michigan Carbon Works, but more recently Secretary and Treasurer of the same, had been arrested, charged with embezzlement. Young has for years past resided in the possession of blooded horses, a noble team and a coachman, all on a salary of \$1,800. But as his father was known to be wealthy, it excited no special attention.
