NATIONAL HORTICULTURISTS.

The Eastern Fruit-Growers to Visit Sacramento in a Body.

SAN JOSE, January 25th.--The members of the American Horticultural Society visited the Normal School this morning, and expressed themselves delighted with its management.

President East made his opening address at the morning session. Some discussion upon it then ensued.

Mr. Kenny, of Southern California, moved the committee of five to appoint a draft resolution for presentation to Congress on the important subject of the preservation of our forests.

Professor Ledpath supported the resolution, and the following were appointed: Mr. Kenny of California, Professor Redpath of Indiana, J. M. Smith of Wisconsin, J. B. Munson of Texas, and J. C. Hubbard of New York.

The meeting then adjourned for lunch. At the afternoon session an invitation from the Sacramento Board of Trade to visit that city was accepted, subject to arrangements. A paper was then read by Smith of Wisconsin, on "Extensive Cultivation," which favored practical farming and encouraged irrigation. A discussion followed.

Professor Redpath read a paper on the expansion of small fruit culture. Munson read a paper entitled "Will the Future Man Eat Peaches?"

P. E. Platt, of Sacramento, then addressed the audience, after which it adjourned.

A MURDERER'S DOOM.

The Slayer of Henry C. Clark Convicted in Calaveras County.

SAN ANDREAS, January 25th.--[Special.] The case of the people against George W. Cox, trial for the killing of Henry C. Clark, Henry G. Clark, was ended this morning by the jury bringing in a verdict of guilty in the first degree, and imposing twenty months. As there was no recommendation the penalty is death, and the judge announced the verdict as the day for pronouncing sentence.

In an interview Cox said that he had no regrets, but insists that he would, under the same circumstances, do it all over again. He was 76th, when in cold blood, with a Winchester rifle, he shot Clark in the back while seated with his family at the dinner table. The verdict is in unanimous accord with the expressed public sentiment.

PORTLAND, January 25th.--A dispatch to the Merchants' Exchange from Astoria says: "The wind is blowing sixty miles an hour. Four vessels are on the sands. These sands are in front of Astoria, fourteen miles inside the mouth of the Columbia, and their position is not at all dangerous. The wire to Astoria was cut down at 12:30 this afternoon."
