A STRIKE ALONG THE SANTA FE SYSTEM.

All Trains Stopped at Four O'clock Yesterday—Fears of Further Trouble.

AROUND THE YARDS.

The Bell Line Railroad Receiving the Burlington Freight.

CHICAGO, March 15th.—When the petition of the Burlington Road against the Bell Line Road came up for hearing this morning, the counsel for the Burlington stated that the Bell Line was now receiving Burlington cars, and evidently making every effort to handle the Burlington freight.

It is stated that the engineers were last night given to understand that they were not to be allowed to handle the Burlington freight if they did not desire to, and as a consequence all of the cars of that line are stopped at the side-tracks in the Union Pacific yards.

MINNEAPOLIS, March 15th.—The Manitoba road today began to move Burlington freight again.

CHICAGO, March 15th.—The Chicago, Burlington and Quincy had a surprise in store for the Western roads today, in the way of an unqualified consent to a restoration of rates, if agreeing to advance them in connection with other Western lines on March 29th.

IN THE SOUTHWEST.

A Strike Along the Whole Atchison and Santa Fe System.

DENVER, March 15th.—A report reached here this evening that all the engineers and firemen on the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe road, running south of La Santa, Col., had struck at 12 o'clock today.

PREPARATIONS FOR THE EMPEROR'S FUNERAL.

Wedding of Prince Oscar of Sweden—Great Storm in Scotland—Bonlanger Again.

HONORS TO THE DEAD.

Scenes in Berlin Preparatory to the Late Emperor's Funeral.

BERLIN, March 15th.—Thousands of persons are arriving daily from the provinces to view the remains of the Emperor lying in state.

Members of the Reichstag and Landtag visited the Cathedral Tuesday night and privately viewed the remains of the Emperor.

In accordance with the request of the Emperor's family, the late Emperor's rooms will be left absolutely intact, just as when he lived in them.

Every house along Unter den Linden is draped with mourning. Brandenburg gate being entirely covered with wreaths.

Along the route of the funeral procession the seats are selling at from five to twenty marks.

ALONG THE ROUTE.

The route to be taken by the funeral procession is three miles long.

At intervals of twenty paces along the route a number of small chapels, which are being erected, and grand arches, forty feet high, will span the whole roadway.

THE COLOGNE MONUMENT.

The municipal authorities of Cologne voted yesterday for a monument to Emperor William.

ENGLISH RESPECT FOR THE DEAD.

LONDON, March 15th.—The War Office has ordered the principal military garri-sons to fly at half-mast to-morrow and to fire a minute gun at noon as a mark of respect for the late Emperor.

THE PRINCE OF WALES ARRIVES.

BERLIN, March 15th.—The Prince of Wales viewed the remains of the late Emperor to-day, and afterwards visited the Czartovitch.

STREET DECORATIONS.

The work of draping the streets is completed. Every street is lined with standards and candelabra four meters high, draped and wrapped with fir and surmounting a globe containing a burning resinous compound.
