INSPECTION OF PUBLIC DOCUMENTS.

The decision of the local Police Court that State officials have rights even reporters of sensational journals are bound to respect, is eminently just. Public records in office hours must unquestionably remain freely open to the people.

Especially in the office of the Executive is there need of maintenance of such privacy as is essential to the discreet discharge of the important duties of high office, and the law itself recognizes that in relation with that office there is a certain amount of secret service.

It will not do to run away with the idea that in a public office, the public, or any individual member of it has the right to do as he pleases, and act according to his own judgment as to how the office should be regulated.

Henry Watterson in the Forum says: "I should be entitled to no respect or credit if I pretended that there is either a fair poll or count of the vast overflow of black votes in States where there is a negro majority."
