LOCAL INTELLIGENCE. HARD CASES. A Large Collection of Them Before Judge Buckley.

There were twenty cases on the Police Court calendar yesterday morning. The case of Bunch Van Tine, charged with battery, was continued until Saturday.

Mrs. Gabriella was tried for petit larceny and found guilty. Thomas Kelly pleaded guilty to battery and malicious mischief and was fined \$20 for the first offense.

The case of Manuel Suzzie, charged with petit larceny, was dismissed. George Jackson and his wife, colored people, were tried on a charge of petit larceny on complaint of one Andrew Anderson.

The Board of Supervisors met in regular session yesterday, all the members present. The demand of John Miller, for \$84 for services as Road Overseer of District No. 18, was ordered paid.

A. S. Hopkins and E. K. Aisp appeared before the Board and requested assistance in placing a display of Sacramento county products in the exhibitions at Cincinnati and Columbus, Ohio.

The Committee on Education and Schools, to whom was referred the petition for a new school district at Highland Park, reported favorably.

Up to Ninety-seven. The Signal Service temperature yesterday at 5 A. M. was 66°, calm and clear; 12 M., 90°, west, 5 miles an hour, and clear; 5 P. M., 90°, southwest, 12 miles an hour. The average temperature was 78°, being 7° warmer than the normal for that day.
