A MOB ASSAULTS A BURLINGTON FREIGHT TRAIN.

Enormous Destruction by Freshets--Sheridan Much Better--Mexican Sufferers--Etc.

READY FOR BUSINESS.

Organization of the Republican National Convention gathered to-day at the Fifth-avenue Hotel.

New York, July 11th.--The National Republican Central Committee and General Committee of the National Republican Convention gathered to-day at the Fifth-avenue Hotel.

The following committee was appointed to name a permanent organization: Haines of Maine, New of Indiana, Fessenden of Maine, Fessenden of Connecticut, De Young of Illinois, Goodlow of Kansas, Davis of Illinois, Blaine of Pennsylvania, Foster of New Jersey, Conger of Ohio, and L. C. Hark of Arkansas.

All the members of the National Committee were present except Warren of Montana and Ryerson of New Mexico.

OFFICERS ELECTED.

New York, July 11th.--The Republican National Central Committee to-day elected M. S. Quay, of Pennsylvania, permanent Chairman, and J. S. Fessenden, of New York, Secretary.

They were also appointed to hold the same offices on the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee of the Convention is as follows: M. H. De Young, of California; Samuel Fessenden, of Connecticut; Geo. K. Davis, of Illinois; John C. New, of Indiana; J. S. Fessenden, of Maine; Goodlow of Kansas; J. S. Fessenden, of Kentucky; J. Manchester Haines, of Maine; Garrett A. Hobart, of New Jersey; and J. S. Fessenden, of New York.

The Presidents of the State Leagues of Republican Clubs held a conference to-day with the National Republican Committee, but no information was given.

A conference committee has been appointed by the Leagues to confer with a similar committee of the National Republican Committee to-morrow.

REPUBLICAN CLUBS.

Much Enthusiasm and the Streets Decorated at Saratoga.

SARATOGA, July 11th.--The Republican Club Convention is in session here. There is much enthusiasm. The stage is adorned with a log cabin and the streets are decorated.

The roll-called showed fifteen clubs, represented by 1,200 delegates.

The Committee on Resolutions, after reporting a series of resolutions regarding the nomination of Harrison and Morton, endorsing the Chicago platform, declining any right to representation in the regular Republican Convention, and assuming the responsibility of conducting a vigorous campaign.

Hafford of Buffalo was elected President of the League.

After an arduous discussion delegates were elected to the Executive Committee of the National League Convention.

The Convention then adjourned till to-morrow.

The Report of the Secretary shows there are 500 Republican clubs in the State, with an aggregate membership of 75,000 to 80,000.

A ratification meeting followed the adjournment, at which speeches were made by E. O. Walker, of Colorado, and William M. Evans and ex-Senator Warner Miller, of New York, and others.

Letters of regret from Benjamin Harrison and Hon. Levi P. Morton were read.

After organization the Institute will adjourn to meet in San Francisco on the 15th inst. in connection with the N. E. A. Convention. Teachers desiring to become members of the Association can receive certificates of membership at the organization.

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LAUGHLIN'S ROOMS.

A RUSHING RIVER.

Unprecedented Rise in the Monongahela--Millions of Dollars Lost.

PITTSBURGH, July 11th.--The freshet in the Monongahela river is unprecedented, and great damage has been done to property all along the river, and the headwaters to this city. The sudden rise took the river men entirely by surprise, and they were not prepared with the great volume of water burst upon them.

At every point between Greensboro and Pittsburg, the water has burst the hills for miles, and the residents have been compelled to live in the upper stories of their houses, and in some cases to leave their homes for safety.

Many had not time to remove their goods, as the water came in at the rate of one hour, and at Greensboro a 32-foot rise was recorded in less than twenty-four hours.

The greatest damage to the river craft occurred to-day. The Republic National Convention to-day elected M. S. Quay, of Pennsylvania, permanent Chairman, and J. S. Fessenden, of New York, Secretary.

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He criticized at length the action of the Postmaster-General in opposing a grant of subsidy for vessels carrying the mails. Some of the public money, he thought, should be expended to secure an efficient mail system, and it would be an inducement for the establishment of a marine service which would command respect abroad and be worthy of the nation which the vessels represent. The amendment was lost by a vote of 28 to 16.

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ATTACK MADE UPON A BURLINGTON TRAIN LAST NIGHT.

CHICAGO, July 11th.--A small riot occurred to-night in the Kieft-street railroad yards, in which two men were injured. A freight train loaded with lumber, freight train was being backed down into the yards on Kinzie street, between Wharton and Seymour streets. Some 200 men and boys were gathered around the train, and they were making an attempt to break into the cars.

As the Burlington engine's headlights appeared a cry of "Scabs!" was raised by the crowd. The crowd at once commenced hurling stones and bricks at the engine. The switch was also thrown open and the engine ran into a ditch and was badly damaged.

The engineer and fireman were severely injured, and were taken to a hospital.

A SWITCHMAN TERRIBLY BEATEN.

KANSAS CITY, July 11th.--A 10 o'clock to-day the boys gathered in front of the switchman's car was put into effect by the switchman of this city. The Wabash and Chicago and the Burlington engines were in the yard, and they were making an attempt to break into the cars.

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
