The London "Times," having a letter from President Cleveland in its possession, after quoting passages from it, editorially says: "It would hardly be possible to put the free-trade case more clearly or more strongly. The arguments which Cleveland uses are those which free-traders would employ now. They are purely free-trade arguments, and as such we are glad to see Cleveland using them, though sorry for the popular infatuation which makes it dangerous to give them their right name."

THE GOLDSON CASE. The action of Governor Waterman in declining to interpose Executive clemency between the law and the offender in the case of Alexander Goldson, will meet with public approval. The prerogative of Executive clemency is lodged in the Governor by the people of the State, to be exercised in the interests of justice, and in such a manner only as will serve the highest interests of society.

UNDESIRABLE immigration has aroused the Canadians, and they are now reported as holding mass meetings to protest against the unrestricted incoming. It is a sign of the spread of the belief that the time has very nearly expired when the ports of the country should remain open for all comers. The Canadians were last of all whom we expected to be aroused upon this question.

When he fell the Republic rose into greater safety—not that it needs to fear the be-medalled General as an individual, but what is back of him has been and still is a menace to the Republic.

FRIDAY night, at Indianapolis, a club composed of 900 railroad artisans, engineers and workers in railroad employment, paraded in honor of General Harrison. This testifies to his popularity with the railroad workers, and gives the lie emphatically to the stories trumped up by the contrary.

SAYS Chairman Estee: "General Harrison is sounder on the Chinese question than any Democrat who can be pointed out." That is true. He voted as reason and his training as a lawyer dictated; his final vote was for the most radical anti-Chinese bill that ever passed the Senate.

THE DAMNABLE PLOT BROKEN UP BY CHICAGO POLICE. A Scheme to Blow Up the Prosecutors of the Haymarket Bomb-Throwers.

CHICAGO'S SENSATION. A Gigantic Plot to Revenge the Anarchists Frustrated.

CHICAGO, July 17.—By bold, timely action, Inspector Bonfield, who has been probably saving the lives of himself and Judges Gary and Grinnell. In a small frame house near Wabash avenue and Thirty-third street were found several dynamite bombs, a revolver and a knife, and as the articles stepped to the sidewalk by the aid of a wire field person and taken to the police station. Two other arrests were made. When questioned as to what the articles intended to do, Bonfield confined himself to saying: "There was a conspiracy of long standing, and it was about to be put into execution. They intended to use the dynamite on Judges Gary and Grinnell and myself. The chief prisoner is an old-time anarchist, and was prominent in the schemes of the Haymarket times."

HOW THE ARREST WAS MADE. Before making the first arrest, Bonfield had the house surrounded by five picked officers. Just as day-light was breaking the Inspector was joined in the vicinity by a stranger, and a few minutes later a man emerged from the house. The stranger nudged Bonfield, and an order was given to an officer to close in on the man. He made a desperate fight, but was quickly overpowered and placed in charge of two officers.

THE OTHER ARRESTS. The officer next went to a house some distance away, which, it is supposed, was 3015 Queen street. Here the two other arrests were made and all three captives taken to the Central station.

A WELL ARRANGED PLOT. Inspector Bonfield is reported to have privately told the plot was well arranged. A group of twenty or thirty men, some of whom were in the conspiracy and were at a certain hour after midnight to meet at the houses of the conspirators. They were to be placed in the houses of these and the powerful explosives were to be touched off simultaneously.

THE NAMES OF THE MEN ARRESTED are John Kronek, Frank Chapek and Frank Chobawa, all Bohemians. The first named is a farrier, street, Chobawa is a tailor and the informer who told the story of the plot to a Bohemian, who in turn detailed it to Inspector Bonfield about ten days ago.

IT seems that since the execution of the Anarchists a movement was started among their followers in Chicago to do business at the old stand.
