NOT FREE WHISKY DOCTRINE.

THE PRIMARY.

AN EXCITING CONTEST AND THE RESULT.

The "Anti-Boss" Ticket Elected in First, Third and Fourth Wards and Generally in the County.

The Republican County Primary election held on Saturday afternoon to elect delegates to the County Convention to be held on Thursday next, was one of the liveliest ever witnessed in the State. The polls were opened at 2 p. m., and from that hour to 7 o'clock the contest was waged with unremitting effort by a large number of experienced workers at nearly all the polling places.

EIGHT MILLION BASKETS.

And Each Filled With Peaches, Large and Luscious.

Under the above heading the Boston Sunday Herald publishes the following, which will be of interest to fruit-growers and shippers in this section:

"Eight million baskets of peaches, says the New York Herald from Report, are expected from Delaware and Maryland this season. It will be the largest peach crop ever gathered. Last season the same territory furnished only 1,500,000 baskets and the whole crop, including that of New Jersey and the Hudson valley, amounted to only 4,500,000 baskets.

The great peach producing sections were formed in the first part of Delaware, and the shipping centers were in the northern counties, but the industry has gradually moved south, and is now centered in the middle and southern counties. The areas devoted to fruit in Maryland have been largely increased, so that the bulk of the crop comes from the lower part of what is called the peach peninsula.
