Mr. Chairman: Your Committee on Platform and Resolutions read the following report, which was adopted almost unanimously.

First—We affirm our devotion to and belief in the principles of the Republican party, as enunciated in the National Platform adopted at Chicago, June, 1888, and pledge our efforts and our untiring success at the ticket there nominated, and the enforcement of the platform we thus approve.

Second—We recognize the nomination of Benjamin Harrison for President, and Levi Morton for Vice-President of the United States. We recognize in General Harrison a man of high character, high ability, and high integrity, without a blemish in his political or public career, a true patriot, who, when the Democratic party was seeking to disrupt this Union, he risked his life and his property in the defense of our country.

Third—We recognize the nomination of Levi P. Morton for Vice-President of the United States.
