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TRESPASS ANIMALS.

They Are Ruining Shade Trees and Should be Promptly Attended to.

These Rascal Cows are doing a fearful amount of mischief, and appear to your valuable property for a hearing, as it is ever ready to champion the right.

The Improvement Association recommended, your paper urged and the citizens felt the need and benefit of shade trees to beautify our streets.

In their zeal to see our thoroughfares lined with ornamental trees, they overlooked one very important item in tree-planting, and that is the protection of the trees from the raids of domestic animals.

These animals, with their horns or browse the tender shoots, and by so doing dwarf the tree. For the top of the tree, is out of their reach (if such is ever the case), the bark is torn off and the tree ruined by the animal in general attached to the animal.

Yet we are asked why do not plant trees and be done with it? On certain sources. Five years ago I planted a row of black walnut at my residence. The first year they were ruined, after I had seen the mischief done by the cows, I water-carried to haul water to keep them alive. I have straightened their twisted stalks and tied them to stakes, but still they are being eaten off as fast as they can eat, and are smaller now than when I set them.

There is, I believe, a city ordinance limiting the number of cows kept by one person, and it is entirely ignored, for the simple reason that the Poundmaster has no backing to protect him in his duty. This has been demonstrated at various times, and the last time he was admonished to be careful and see that no more complaints were made against him, or he would lose his position.

If the law is ineffectual to protect the many against the few, why not abolish it? As it now is there is loose stock on the streets at all times, and the Poundmaster is so much troubled through fear of a rebuke from the law, that he is unable to give the protection he is ever warranted.


