CONGRESSIONAL PROCEEDINGS. The Senate.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—In the Senate this morning Senator Fry reported favorably the Outward Pacific Railroad bill, which he received the signatures of the whole committee.

A number of bills were reported by Senator Plumb from the Committee on Public Lands, and by Senator Sherman from the Committee on Indian Affairs.

A joint resolution was introduced and adopted authorizing the chair to appoint a Commission to investigate the commercial relations of the United States with Canada.
