In sporting parlance, the President to-day sent the Senate and people a message better, after saying that he believes the treaty was well suited to the exigency, and that the fisheries treaty, as negotiated by Bayard and his assistant, Commissioners, was regarded by the majority of the Senate as a surrender of American rights and a concession of respect to the protection of the subject by the present Administration.
