She needs to maintain her position as a ruler over provinces and dominions and states, from Canada to India, and Australia to Ireland; but she cannot do this, or keep up her monarchical system, unless the wheels of her industries revolve, her spinners hum, and her ill-paid workers are kept at labor.

We are advised by the best of authority that the Democracy in this city—where it is in a hopeless minority—probably elsewhere, has resorted to an old trick to defeat the will of the people.

This supplement was printed last Friday from the press of the Indianapolis Sentinel, the organ of the Democratic party, and the paper that first gave publicity to the vile slander on Mr. Blaine in 1884.

The supplement contains pretended accounts of the railroad strike of 1887, and General Harrison's connection therewith, which are grossly false.

The whole country was astonished at Mr. Secretary Bayard's inability to see impropriety and offense, breach of duty and official obligation in Minister West's interference in American politics.

West got Mr. Bayard and Mr. Cleveland to agree to extension of the fisheries treaty articles originally.

As far back as 1861 a Republican Representative in Congress from Massachusetts (Thos. D. Elliott) introduced a bill in Congress to prohibit the importation of coolies.

The new treaty was negotiated precisely as Lord Sackville wished it. So too, relative to the Chinese matter, West influenced the Administration.

The exact value that should be given to the San Francisco Examiner's statements when it has interests at stake, is to be ascertained by its declaration that the great Republican demonstration in this city on Wednesday night was a practical failure.

The Democracy is very hard pushed when it asks the American people to re-elect Mr. Cleveland because the remaining Chinese are still at work in California.

The American protective doctrine is not to be put aside by any anti-Chinese "whoop-up" in the last days of the campaign.

General Harrison, who reported and supported the best Chinese restrictive bill ever introduced into Congress, will not be elected, and all the diversions from the real issue that the Democrats may attempt will not prevent General Harrison from being inaugurated.

A FLOOD OF LIES AGAINST GENERAL HARRISON
