HARRISON REMEMBERED.

Holiday Gifts Received Yesterday by the President.

INDIANAPOLIS, December 31st.-General Harrison received another unique Christmas present to-day. It is a cane, carved from a single piece of poplar wood, the work of Cree, Neb. The handle consists of an erect tree-image, supported by a pair of eagle's talons. The donor writes that this gift is intended to typify "Democracy without protection." From each hand the image has a chain, the central links of which are small eagles with movable claws within. The chains are attached to a cut in the cane. The cane is about four feet in length, and is decorated with four faces of the eagle, spades, hearts and diamonds. This cane, which is the fourth party holiday gift, will be below in a small square with General Harrison's initials carved therein.

Another gift that came to-day was a handsome, framed historical portrait of a Veteran Appellate Court of Oakland, Cal., surrounded by flags elegantly worked. Beneath are the names of the members of the court, "John 1-5, 8, 9," relating to Benjamin. This follows the memorial of 100 Appellate Veterans of California. The names from J. M. Johnson, President of the Club; A. B. Hull, Vice-President, and John L. Bromley, Marshal.
