CITY TRUSTEES

The Neglect of an Election Board Causes a Little Flurry. The Board of City Trustees met at 10 A. M. yesterday, all the members present.

The Lone Coal and Iron Company was awarded the contract to furnish fuel for the water works for one year from April 1st to March 31st, 1890.

Trustee Wolf said he had not noticed by Chief of Police Lee that Mrs. Anderson had closed her dispendable drive on Front street, between 1 and J.

After reading quite a number of bills and ordering the same read by the Board proceeded to canvass the returns of the city election held on Tuesday, March 12th.

The ballot boxes were opened and the vault and everything tallied out all right until Precinct Three and a half was reached. The tally report in that box has not been certified to by the Board.

The Mayor called Wilbur Smith, the Inspector by telephone and told him he must get the Election Board together at once to certify to the returns.

At 4 P. M. the Board reconvened. The Election Board which served at Precinct Three and a half appeared and showed the correctness of the tally sheets of that polling place.

Assessor—J. J. Buckley, 3,046; J. Alexander, 1,368; F. A. Shapton, 280.

Fire Commissioner—George B. Blue, 2,186; W. D. Comstock, 2,530.

The following were then declared elected for the ensuing term: Second Trustee, William McLaughlin—majority, 241.

Auditor, E. H. McKee—majority, 29. Collector, George A. Putnam—majority, 1,444.

Assessor, J. J. Buckley—majority, 1,688. Fire Commissioner, W. D. Comstock—majority, 344.

The Board resolved the ballot-boxes and placed the same in a cell of the jail and caused the door of the same to be properly locked and sealed, pending a contest that is expected to be made.

There being no further business the Board then adjourned.

GLENN COUNTY

A LARGE DELEGATION VISITS THE GOVERNOR. Speeches by Messrs. Goucher, Shanahan and Hart—Governor Waterman's Response.

Eight carloads of excursionists came down from Willows yesterday afternoon. It is said the party consisted of several hundred people, eighty of whom were ladies.

They were met at the depot by Senator Goucher, Assemblymen E. C. Hart and T. W. H. Shanahan. The party was accompanied by the Willows Brass Band in full uniform, who discoursed excellent music at the head of the column on route to the State Capitol, and on arrival in Capitol Park serenaded the Governor.

The immense delegation attracted considerable attention along the line of march. They arrived at the Assembly Chamber at 3:45, and that room, down stairs and the gallery, was thronged. It was an interesting assemblage.

Gray-haired men and those in their prime, matrons and maids, all marching to the strains of martial music, with flags flying to the breeze. The ladies brought garlands of flowers as a present to the Chief Executive.

When Senator Goucher and Assemblymen Hart and Shanahan marched into the Assembly Chamber, each bearing a good-sized American flag, the audience cheered them heartily, the ladies standing and waving their handkerchiefs.

The meeting was called to order by E. C. Hart, the Senator in charge of the delegation. He then introduced the Honorable Governor and Ladies from Glenn County. In order that your claims shall be properly presented to the Governor you should have a Chairman of this meeting. Nominations for Chairman are now in order.

Fred Crawford, of Willows, was named for the post, and unanimously accepted, while Moses Hochmeister was elected Secretary.

Shanahan moved that a committee of three be appointed by the Chair to wait upon the Governor and escort him to the Assembly Chamber.

The Chair named as such committee Messrs. Dippencup, O'Brien and Merrill. Before the committee had time to act the Governor arose and made a few remarks.

The Governor was escorted to the Speaker's Chair and given the post of honor.

The Chair stated that Senator Goucher and Assemblymen Shanahan and Hart would state the views of the Glenn county people to the Governor.

When Senator Goucher stepped up to the Speaker's desk he was greeted with a perfect storm of applause and the waving of handkerchiefs. He said:

I have been chosen to represent to the Governor of California the people of Glenn county, and I am proud to do so.

The Governor listened to the speech with attention, and then responded to the delegation.

Senator Goucher then introduced the other members of the delegation.

Assemblyman Hart then spoke, and Assemblyman Shanahan followed.


