DOMESTIC NEWS.

A HEAVY SNOW-STORM ON THE EASTERN COAST. The City of Savannah Almost Destroyed by Fire. Perilous Ride in Dakota.

(SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE RECORD-UNION.) ORGANIZED LABOR. Putting Axe Grease Into Beer and Blowing Up Buildings.

New York, April 7th.—An explosion, presumably of a dynamite bomb, which killed Henry A. Fitzgerald, president of the Executive Committee of the labor union men, four of whom are in custody at the police headquarters.

The fire then jumped to a magnificent building known as Old Fellows' Hall. It was totally destroyed, representing a loss of \$125,000.

The second and third stories of a base-ment were immediately wrecked, and the hall was also destroyed; loss, \$5,000 to \$10,000.

The fire next spread from the corner of Barnard and State streets through twelve or fifteen brick dwellings, completely destroying them; they represent a loss of \$75,000, including contents.

The air was filled with sparks, one of which lodged on the steeple of the Independent Church, which was also destroyed.

The city has only four fire engines, and all were needed in the business part of the city. No attempt was made to fight the fire during the night.

In the meantime the fire had commenced on the copola on the large four-story brick building used as a store for paints, and was extinguished by the firemen.

The loss on the building and contents is probably \$80,000. This was the handsomest brick arsenal of the Savannah Guards Battalion, which was totally destroyed.

The loss on the building and contents is probably \$85,000. Ten or fifteen dwellings were also burned, in which the loss is probably \$15,000.

It is impossible to tell where the fire will stop, as the sparks are starting new conflagrations in spots quite remote from those where the original fire started.

At midnight the fire was under control. The general manager of the warehouse, which the fire swept away all the structures on each side of Whitaker street, being not fine buildings, but will probably add \$25,000 to the losses mentioned in earlier dispatches.

The fire also swept along the Independent Church, which was destroyed. The loss on the building and contents is probably \$15,000.

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WASHINGTON.

PRESIDENT HARRISON TOOK CO-MUNION YESTERDAY. The Coast Defense Vessel Likely to be Built at San Francisco—The Supreme Court.

(SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE RECORD-UNION.) A HUGE ENGINE OF WAR. The Coast Defense Vessel to be Built at San Francisco.

WASHINGTON, April 7th.—The Sunday Herald says: The bids for the construction of the coast defense vessel, for which there is \$1,700,000 appropriated, are still in the hands of the Navy Department officials.

The Chairman of the meeting gave a glowing description of the new territory, and the Pacific Coast would be several times as large as the present territory.

CHARLOTTEVILLE (Va.), April 7th.—The snow-storm which began yesterday morning continued throughout the night. Telegraph wires are badly broken down and all communication is suspended.

RICHMOND (Va.), April 7th.—The worst storm of the season prevailed here yesterday. It commenced with thunder and lightning, and was followed by rain, hail, snow, and high winds.

WINCHESTER (Va.), April 7th.—A furious snow-storm and blizzard prevailed here all day yesterday. The snow fell to a depth of fourteen inches, the most that has fallen during the entire winter.

EVANSVILLE (Ind.), April 7th.—A strong newspaper syndicate, composed of some of the leading papers in America, has just been consummated by A. J. Miller of this city, for the purpose of a scientific exploration of the continent.

ST. PAUL, April 7th.—Herbert G. Stout, railway mail clerk, on the route between St. Paul and Council Bluffs, was arrested by the Postoffice Inspector and Deputy United States Marshal, Stout is charged with robbing the mails, and it is supposed he has been very successful in his operations during the past year.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 7th.—The world's largest and most magnificent day sails is largely attended, nearly 1,000 delegates and guests have already departed for Chicago.

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
