THE DANMARK.

How the Accident to Her Machinery Occurred.

LONDON, April 22.-A detailed statement of the Denmark accident has been received from First Officer Balson. The shaft broke on the 14th instant, when the vessel rose on the crest of a wave. The shaft broke in the mainmast, and the engine and the ragged end connected with the engine rose a hole in the bottom of the vessel, causing another leak. The machinery was completely disabled, and no attempt was made to mend the shaft, which would have been useless, even if possible.

The vessel at once fell into the trough of the sea, but fortunately the after compartment was closed, which kept the water back. The vessel was put before the wind. Sail being gone up at once and the engine started, the vessel was followed as well as possible. Nothing could be done to free the vessel's after compartments, but the pumps worked for some time, and the vessel fell in the trough of the sea. The Missouri was sighted on the 5th inst. After the Denmark was taken to tow the Missouri held on for some time. On the 5th she was seen to be hopeless. So much water was in the hold that the Denmark lost buoyancy. Every time she went down in the trough of the sea her passengers thought it would be her last plunge. The Missouri was towed to a short conference Captain Merle of the Missouri agreed to let down a portion of her cargo and to allow room between decks for the Denmark's passengers.

The work of jettisoning the cargo and transferring the passengers began simultaneously. The passengers were each allowed to take a reasonable kit of clothing for personal effects, but it was necessarily limited, and many lost heavily.

OUR SISTER REPUBLIC.

Telegraph Poles Must Go in the Capital City-Other Matters.

CITY OF MEXICO, April 22.-The municipal government of Mexico has proposed to remove from the streets all telegraph, telephone and electric light poles.

Why Boulanger Fled from France.

LONDON, April 22.-Boulanger's friends now father the story that Boulanger fled from France because he was afraid to be arrested. They say Boulanger is responsible for the details. He was to be arrested by the Paris police under a pretense of confining him alive to prison, when he was to be led where some ruffians were to be ambushed. He was to be taken to prison by the Paris police. The police were to pretend to repel the assault, but were to shoot him as if by mistake. Had this failed, he was to have been sentenced to death by a one-sided court-martial and executed twenty-four hours later. Accordingly he fled from France.

A Riot in Austria.

VIENNA, April 22.-The rioting in connection with the strike of the train cars was renewed here today. The strikers attacked the cars and succeeded in smashing many of them. The cavalry were again called out, and a charge was made upon the strikers, many of whom were wounded. About one hundred strikers were arrested.

Over Twenty Thousand Rioters.

VIENNA, April 22.-Midnight-The Paris rioters gathered in the city. The rioters were estimated to be over 20,000. One man was wounded to death, and many persons were injured.
